

Synopsis of the Activity:

The seminar introduced law students to the role of economic principles in dispute resolution. Advocate Ronak Chabbiria engaged the students with real-life examples and an interactive discussion on how economics plays a vital role in legal practice. He explained the relevance of economic concepts such as the Coase Theorem and rational decision-making in advising clients and resolving disputes.

The lecture began with a brief overview of basic economic principles to ensure that students, especially first-year attendees, could grasp their application. A highlight was the discussion on the recent legal case of *Humans of Bombay vs. People of India*, illustrating how economic factors influence dispute outcomes and legal strategies. Through this case, the speaker demonstrated how economic advice helps clients understand the cost-benefit analysis in legal disputes.

Key Takeaways:

- Students understood the connection between economics and dispute resolution.
- The seminar emphasized the importance of looking at legal disputes through the lens of economic efficiency and rational behavior.
- Students learned about the application of the Coase Theorem in real-world legal scenarios and how economic theories assist in resolving disputes.





Summary of the Activity:

This seminar aimed at equipping law students, particularly first-year students, with an understanding of how economic principles are integral to various areas of law, including dispute resolution. It highlighted how a practicing advocate like Ronak Chabbiria applied economics in advising clients, framing legal strategies, and resolving disputes. 



Synopsis of the Activity:

The Skill Development session focused on the ecological crisis faced by Earth, particularly through the lens of animal agriculture, urbanization, and industrialization. The event used multimedia tools such as documentaries and scenes from films to critically engage students with the issues of environmental degradation.

Highlights of the Activity:

- **Documentary Screening:** "Eating Our Way to Extinction," focusing on the role of animal agriculture in deforestation, carbon emissions, and ocean dead zones.
- **Film Analysis:** Scenes from Charlie Chaplin's *Modern Times* were analyzed for their depiction of urbanization, industrialization, and class exploitation.
- **Discussion of Wall-E:** Clips from the animated film *Wall-E* were used to explore ecological destruction, herd mentality, and the consequences of capitalism.

Key Takeaways:

- **Dystopian Future in Wall-E:** The film raised awareness about how consumerism and capitalism could lead to the destruction of Earth, reflecting on the potential future of the planet.







Summary of the Activity:

The Gender and Intersectionality Forum (GSF) organized this session to highlight the intersectionality between various forms of oppression and the ecological crisis. The session commenced with the screening of *Eating Our Way to Extinction*, focusing on the global consequences of animal agriculture. Following the documentary, participants discussed the environmental impact of deforestation, displaced indigenous tribes, and the harmful effects of fish farming.

The second half of the session involved a critical analysis of scenes from the *Modern Times*, which showcased the negative impact of rapid urbanization and industrialization on the working class. Lastly, clips from *Wall-E* explored the themes of capitalism, ecological destruction, and herd mentality, fostering discussions about humanity's role in creating a dystopian future.

Descriptive Report:

The session traced the roots of the ecological crisis to human activities such as animal agriculture, industrialization, and capitalist consumerism. It highlighted the importance of understanding how these actions contribute to the degradation of the environment and oppress marginalized communities. The films and discussions encouraged students to reflect on how their consumption patterns could impact the environment and society.

Synopsis of the Activity:

The Nagara Inauguration Ceremony marked the formal launch of the **urban-specific and city exploration club**, Nagara. The event featured a thought-provoking lecture by **Prof. Sarbani Sharma**, focusing on how we can rethink contemporary life through cities. In addition to the lecture, there were several stalls set up in the Quadrangle to engage participants in exploring different aspects of city life.

Highlights of the Activity:

- Official inauguration of the **Nagara City Exploration Club**.
- Interactive stalls in the Quadrangle on themes related to urban life and experiences.
- An insightful talk by **Prof. Sarbani Sharma** on deconstructing common perceptions about cities.

Key Takeaways:

- Participants were encouraged to explore cities through non-conventional narratives and **challenge stereotypes** associated with urban spaces.
- The lecture promoted an understanding of cities beyond just physical landscapes, focusing on aspects such as **smell**, **colors**, **and lived experiences**.
- Prof. Sharma emphasized the need to rethink our bourgeois perceptions of cities, advocating for a **decolonial approach** to urban exploration.
- The idea that cities should not only be studied for what has been lost due to urbanization but also for what has evolved and been created was a central theme of the talk.



• The speaker encouraged participants to explore cities from the perspectives of those often overlooked, such as **delivery workers**, **cleaners**, **and other essential workers**, who form the backbone of city life.



Summary of the Activity:

The Nagara Inauguration Ceremony began with a welcome address by **Mr. Aryan Gulati**, after which **Prof. Sarbani Sharma** took the stage to inaugurate the club officially. In her lecture, Prof. Sharma discussed how it is impossible to fully comprehend cities, which have become spaces of **planetary urbanization** shaped by predominant experiences and stereotypes. She referred to these as "bourgie" narratives and stressed the importance of **deconstructing these imaginations** to truly understand cities.

She elaborated on the **cultural and historical relevance** of religious spaces in cities and described how community spaces in urban settings are often more cohesive than in rural areas. Prof. Sharma also encouraged the participants to explore cities through diverse perspectives,



including those of underappreciated urban workers like delivery personnel, cleaners, and Asha workers.

One interesting method suggested was the use of **smell-walking exercises**, where participants would understand the city through its olfactory landscape, offering a unique approach to city exploration.

After the talk, a **Q&A session** was conducted, followed by an address by **Dr. Nivea Thomas K**. The event concluded with participants engaging in the various stalls set up by the **Nagara club** members in the Quadrangle, which showcased different aspects of city life.

Synopsis of the Activity:

The Skill Development Session involved the screening of the film *Antebellum*, which addresses issues surrounding race, violence, and the objectification of women. The film portrays the brutal experiences of Black lives subjected to a fictional, yet deeply disturbing, Confederate-era plantation. It explores the themes of white supremacy, oppression, and women's struggles for freedom.

Highlights of the Activity:

- The film sheds light on the **violence inflicted upon Black people**, particularly women, as part of white supremacist fantasies.
- The plantation depicted in the film is an **intense cosplay arena** where white supremacists reenact the Confederate era, enslaving and torturing Black people.
- The film showcases how **women are objectified** and tortured for not complying with the soldiers.
- It ends with a powerful **revenge plot** that symbolizes the demolition of supremacist ideologies.

Key Takeaways:

- 1. The film highlights how white supremacists gratify themselves by reenacting violence against Black people, making them the primary guilty party.
- 2. The story concludes with the **reinstatement of freedom** for the protagonist and the **destruction of the oppressive structures** that glorify the Confederate past.





Summary of the Activity:

The movie *Antebellum* was screened as part of a skill development session hosted by the **Gender Studies Forum**. The film focuses on the character of **Veronica Henley**, an academic and revolutionary, who is known for her lectures advocating radical changes in American society. During a visit to New Orleans, she is kidnapped and finds herself on a plantation where white supremacists reenact slavery for their amusement.

Veronica is portrayed as a strong and wise leader, embodying the feminist representation of Black women in cinema. Her experience on the plantation reveals the deep-seated violence and oppression faced by Black people, particularly women. As Veronica endures rape and physical abuse, she devises a **plan for revenge** and eventual escape, showcasing her strength and resilience.

The screening was followed by a brief **discussion session**, where participants reflected on the film's powerful message about race, supremacy, and the fight for liberation.

Follow-up Plan:

A small discussion about the movie was conducted, providing an opportunity for participants to share their thoughts and interpretations of the film's themes and its portrayal of oppression and resistance.

The water system of the city was also discussed, with the speaker highlighting how the **constant use of water pumps** contributes to high electricity usage.

The speaker also discussed the **destruction of grasslands** due to British colonization and commercial crop plantations, which have affected water availability in the rivers. He emphasized the importance of **indigenous conservation methods** and warned against Western-centric approaches to environmental conservation.

Toward the end of the session, the speaker advocated for **reducing consumption**, **sharing resources**, and raising awareness about the **environmental conditions** around us. He encouraged students to adopt sustainable practices in their everyday lives.

- Ms. Shruti Tharayil provided a detailed overview of uncultivated greens, urban foraging, and sustainable agro-economic practices.
- Participants learned about the edible, medicinal, and agricultural uses of various wild plants.
- The activity included identifying plant species with the help of an information booklet and engaging in hands-on learning by touching, smelling, and tasting the plants.
- Differences between native and invasive species were discussed, emphasizing the need for sustainable gardening and agricultural practices.

• Key Takeaways:

- **Identification Skills:** Students learned to identify wild flora and understand their edible and medicinal uses.
- **Experiential Learning:** The walk provided hands-on experience with urban vegetation, enhancing understanding of indigenous knowledge systems and sustainable food practices.
- Sustainable Practices: Participants learned about the impact of invasive species on local ecosystems and the potential uses of wild plants in sustainable living, including income generation, water filtration, and soil regeneration.



• Summary of the Activity:

The field visit was organized on 13 January 2024, from 3 to 5 PM, at Cubbon Park for the students of the MAECS Capstone project 'The Culture of Food'. The objective was to introduce students to urban foraging and the wide range of uncultivated flora often



overlooked as weeds.

The event began with introductions, where participants shared their motivations and past foraging experiences. An information booklet titled 'Spot Your Greens' was distributed to aid independent exploration. Ms. Shruti Tharayil led the group through the park, encouraging interaction with the surrounding flora. Plants discussed included 'Touch Me Not', 'Alligator Weed', 'Cattail', and the 'Toothache Plant'. Students were encouraged to engage with these plants through touch, smell, and taste.

The facilitator also highlighted the issue of invasive species, which, despite being used in urban beautification projects, often negatively impact native vegetation. The walk included the discovery of plants like tassel flowers and nightshade berries, with explanations of their edibility and palatability. Additionally, the utility of undergrowth like nutgrass and 'gotu kola' in regenerative farming was discussed.

The activity provided valuable experiential knowledge on local sustainable food sourcing and food sovereignty, aligning with the principles of sustainable cities and responsible consumption.
