Workshop On Contract Drafting, Focusing On Investment And Transaction Docu



Intensive Workshop On Contract Drafting CHRIST (Deemed to be University)

The Department of Legal Studies at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) organized an intensive workshop on contract drafting, focusing on investment and transaction documents. The session covered key areas such as drafting share purchase agreements, subscription agreements, and ancillary contracts involved in investment deals. Expert speakers delved into the intricacies of various stages of investment transactions, highlighting due diligence, investor protection, and balanced contractual terms. The discussions provided students with a comprehensive understanding of drafting commercial contracts, drawing from various disciplines within the legal field.



In addition to the theoretical sessions, the workshop featured a drafting competition where students were challenged with real-world scenarios. This interactive competition allowed participants to apply the skills they had learned, drafting legal documents under time pressure. The competition offered an invaluable learning experience, as students received detailed feedback from experienced legal professionals. The high-pressure environment fostered collaboration and quick thinking, enhancing the students' ability to draft precise and comprehensive contracts.





The workshop not only focused on technical legal skills but also emphasized the importance of commercial awareness in contract drafting. Students left with a deeper understanding of how to structure agreements with clear communication, legal precision, and risk mitigation. Plans for follow-up sessions and one-on-one mentorships were discussed to help students continue developing their skills in specialized areas like mergers and acquisitions (M&As), private equity agreements, and technology contracts. The event was a success, with a budget of Rs 53,000, and income generated reaching Rs 60,800.



National Symposium On Corporate Juris Nexus



National Symposium on Corporate Juris Nexus 29th September 2023 CHRIST (Deemed to be University)

The School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organized the "1st National Symposium on Corporate Juris Nexus" in an online format via Google Meet. The event featured prominent legal experts, including partners from prestigious law firms like Shardul Amarchand Mangaldas & Co., J Sagar Associates, Samvad Partners, and Khaitan & Co. The symposium was attended by 64 participants, comprising students from various law courses across India. The speakers delved into key aspects of corporate law, including mergers and acquisitions (M&A), insolvency, corporate restructuring, and banking and finance. Their discussions provided a comprehensive overview of current trends and challenges in these fields, offering students an opportunity to engage with cutting-edge legal concepts.



A major highlight of the symposium was the discussion on the "Prison Pill" strategy in M&A, which is employed by target companies to fend off hostile takeovers. The speakers also emphasized the critical role of technology in M&A transactions, serving as both a tool for due diligence and a potential source of risk. Cybersecurity concerns, antitrust



regulations, and competition law were thoroughly examined as key factors in corporate transactions. Through case studies and expert insights, the students gained a deeper understanding of the legal, financial, and operational risks involved in corporate deals, making the symposium a significant learning experience.



The event was highly interactive, with students actively participating and posing thought-provoking questions to the panel of experts. The symposium succeeded in fostering awareness and enthusiasm for corporate law among the participants. Moving forward, the School of Law aims to continue organizing such national-level events, with plans for more focused discussions on corporate law topics based on student feedback. Financially, the event was efficiently managed, with a budget of INR 33,500, an actual expenditure of INR 7,822, and an income of INR 32,009, ensuring a successful and sustainable event.




Introductory Mooting Rounds



Introductory Mooting Rounds 31st July to 1st August 2023 EVENT 4th and 5th floors of the Central Block


The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, conducted the Introductory Mooting Rounds (IMR) for first-year law students from 31st July to 1st August 2023. This competition, held on the 4th and 5th floors of the Central Block, aimed to introduce new students to the world of mooting, allowing them to develop essential courtroom skills. A total of 400 students participated, representing either the plaintiff or defendant in a moot court setting. The event was overseen by 62 judges comprising fourth and fifth-year law students, while third-year students acted as coaches, helping participants prepare for the rounds.



The highlight of the IMR was the moot proposition based on Tort Law, specifically focusing on trespass and defamation. Participants were provided with guidance on how to conduct legal research, present arguments, and follow courtroom procedures. Each team was assigned either the plaintiff or defendant's side and was evaluated by the senior student judges on various criteria. The competition not only gave first-year students a glimpse into the intricate process of mooting but also instilled in them the necessary skills and knowledge required for future legal competitions.

The Introductory Mooting Rounds were a success, with enthusiastic participation from the first-year students and valuable feedback provided by the judges. The Moot Court Society plans to build on this momentum by organizing more competitions, such as the Internal National Ranking Rounds and the Internal Mooting Championships for first to fifth-year students. These upcoming events will further hone the students' legal acumen and prepare them for external national and international moot court competitions. The total budget allocated for the IMR was Rs. 5,380, with Rs. 3,763 spent on the successful execution of the event.




Internal National Ranking Rounds



Internal National Ranking Rounds 26th and 27th August 2023 4th and 5th floors of the Central Block

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, organized the Internal National Ranking Rounds (INRR) on 26th and 27th August 2023. This intra-departmental activity was held on the 4th and 5th floors of the Central Block and involved 477 students from across all five years of the law program. The competition provided participants with an opportunity to represent either the petitioners or respondents and prepare memorandums for both sides. The event was judged by 60 external judges, including litigating and corporate advocates, senior associates, partners, and legal practitioners.



The INRR centered on a moot proposition based on Constitutional Law, focusing on the doctrine of basic structure, judicial review, anti-defection laws, and the interpretation of the definition of 'state.' Students were trained in legal research, drafting memorandums, and presenting arguments in a courtroom setting. The oral rounds were conducted with external judges who evaluated the students based on various criteria and offered



valuable feedback. This competition aimed to rank the teams, enabling them to bid for external moot court competitions.



The event successfully fulfilled its objectives, with enthusiastic participation and constructive learning experiences. The Moot Court Society plans to continue developing students' mooting skills by organizing additional competitions, such as the Internal International Mooting Championship (IIMC) and the Internal Mooting Championship (IMC). These future events will further strengthen the mooting culture within the student community at CHRIST, encouraging active participation in national and international competitions.




Internal International Scheduled Moot Ranking Rounds



Internal International Scheduled Moot Ranking Rounds 2nd and 3rd September 2023

CHRIST (Deemed to be University), BangalorE

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, organized the Internal International Scheduled Moot Ranking Rounds (IISMRR) on the 2nd and 3rd of September 2023. This intra-departmental activity was designed to provide undergraduate BA/BBA LLB students the opportunity to compete in international moot court simulations. A total of 153 students participated, competing for rankings that would determine their eligibility for external international moot court competitions. The event was held on the 4th floor of the Central Block, with four external judges, including international law experts, senior associates, and partners from leading legal practices, evaluating the participants' performances.



The moot problem for IISMRR was based on International Criminal Law, with a focus on critical issues such as crimes against humanity, war crimes, genocide, and the Geneva Conventions. Participants were tasked with drafting memorandums for either the Prosecution or Defense and presenting oral arguments in front of the judges. This competition provided students with valuable exposure to the research and procedural aspects of international law mooting. The external judges offered detailed feedback, evaluating students on various parameters such as legal reasoning, advocacy, and



presentation skills. The event served as a crucial platform for students to refine their legal acumen in a competitive and rigorous setting.

Following the successful completion of the IISMRR, the Moot Court Society plans to organize further activities such as the Internal International Mooting Championship (IIMC) and the Internal Mooting Championship (IMC). These initiatives aim to enhance the development of mooting skills among undergraduate law students and foster a strong mooting culture within the university. The total budget allocated for the event was Rs. 61,813, with an expenditure of Rs. 46,179, ensuring the smooth execution of the competition.




14th National Moot Court Competition




14th National Moot Court Competition 2nd to February 4th, 2024 Moot Court Hall, and the Main Auditorium

The 14th National Moot Court Competition (NMCC) was held at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), School of Law, in association with Cyril Amarchand Mangaldas (CAM) from February 2nd to February 4th, 2024. This prestigious national-level competition saw the participation of 41 teams, comprising 121 law students from institutions across India. The competition took place in various locations within the university, including the 4th and 5th floor classrooms, the Moot Court Hall, and the Main Auditorium. The event featured external judges ranging from Associates to Senior Partners from law firms, as well as sitting High Court and Supreme Court judges, making it a rigorous and highly competitive platform for students to showcase their mooting skills.



The moot problem for the 14th NMCC revolved around Health Law and Constitutional Law, focusing on the tension between government-prescribed medical protocols and the autonomy of medical practitioners. Participants were required to research extensively, draft memorandums for both petitioners and respondents, and present their arguments before a distinguished panel of judges. The competition provided an invaluable learning experience, where students honed their legal research, drafting, and oral advocacy skills. They also gained insight into complex legal principles and were exposed to real-world legal challenges, receiving detailed feedback from experienced practitioners and judges.







The 14th NMCC successfully fulfilled its purpose of providing a platform for law students to engage in high-level legal analysis and advocacy. The event fostered a spirit of healthy competition, encouraging participants to critically examine legal issues and respond to the challenging questions posed by the bench. Following the successful completion of this competition, the Moot Court Society plans to organize more internal competitions, such as the Internal Mooting Championship and Internal International Mooting Championship, to further enhance the mooting culture within the university and nurture the next generation of skilled legal advocates.





Internal International Mooting Championship

March 14th to 18th, 2024, CHRIST (Deemed to be University)

The Internal International Mooting Championship (IIMC) 2024, held from March 14th to 18th, 2024, at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), School of Law, was an intra-departmental activity designed for first- and second-year law students. The event aimed to introduce these students to the intricacies of international moot court competitions. Fourth- and fifth-year law students served as judges, while third-year students acted as coaches, guiding participants through the research and presentation process. The event provided an excellent platform for participants to hone their legal research, drafting, and oral advocacy skills, with a particular focus on international law.





The moot problem presented to the students was based on key international law issues, including genocide, ICJ jurisdiction, and environmental law, particularly regarding ocean pollution caused by illegal industrial discharge. This allowed students to engage with subjects like public international law, refugee law, and international relations. Through this exercise, participants developed critical skills such as crafting legal arguments, responding to challenging questions, and performing rebuttals, all of which are essential in the competitive world of international moot courts. Additionally, the event fostered professional conduct and the development of formal arguing techniques.



The IIMC 2024 not only aligned with the academic goals of enhancing legal education but also supported the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 14 (Life Below Water), and SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions). By simulating real-world legal challenges and promoting discussions around justice, international agreements, and environmental preservation, the event contributed significantly to the students' legal acumen while addressing global concerns related to environmental and institutional justice.




Internal Mooting Championship



Internal Mooting Championship March 22nd to 25th, 2024 CHRIST (Deemed to be University)

The Internal Mooting Championship (IMC) 2024, organized by the School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), was an interdepartmental competition held for first- and second-year law students from March 22nd to 25th, 2024. The event provided students with hands-on experience in mooting, offering them the opportunity to represent either the plaintiff or the defendant in a complex legal proposition. The competition was judged by fourth- and fifth-year law students, while third-year students acted as coaches, guiding participants through their research and preparation. The competition aimed to strengthen students' understanding of the Law of Contracts and arbitration procedures, with 135 participants engaging enthusiastically.



The moot problem for the IMC 2024 was based on the Law of Contracts, focusing on the performance of contracts and the arbitration clause. This allowed participants to delve deeply into legal research, develop their argumentative skills, and understand court procedures. The judges, composed of senior law students, evaluated the participants on



multiple parameters, providing them with feedback to help them refine their advocacy skills. This competition served as a platform for students to learn the nuances of mooting, from drafting legal memoranda to presenting oral arguments in a formal courtroom setting.



The IMC 2024 successfully achieved its goal of providing an immersive learning experience for the first- and second-year law students, enhancing their legal acumen and skills. By aligning with Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 4 (Quality Education) and SDG 16 (Peace, Justice, and Strong Institutions), the competition contributed to skill development in critical thinking, legal reasoning, and dispute resolution. Digital Evidence In Cyber Crime



Digital Evidence in Cyber Crime August 28, 2023 CHRIST (Deemed to be University)

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) hosted a conference on "Digital Evidence in Cyber Crime" on August 28, 2023, led by Advocate Nagendra Naik. This event, organized by the Advanced Criminal Law Studies Committee, was attended by 277 fifth-year law students. The conference focused on the growing importance of digital evidence in criminal investigations and the courts' approach to assessing such evidence. Sunidhi Hegde, a core committee member, delivered the introductory speech, followed by Adv. Naik's presentation, which shed light on key topics, including the stages of criminal investigation and trial, the role of digital evidence, and the significance of Section 65B of the Indian Evidence Act, which governs the admissibility of electronic records in court.



The conference emphasized the critical role of digital evidence in corroborating events, proving intent, and supporting the legal framework in cybercrime cases. Adv. Naik explained how digital evidence is collected, verified, and presented in court, offering practical insights into the complexities of criminal investigations. The discussion on Section 65B was particularly insightful, as it outlined the legal criteria that electronic records must meet to be considered valid evidence in a trial. The conference provided the students with a comprehensive understanding of the intersection between technology and law, equipping them with the knowledge to navigate future cases involving digital evidence.





This conference was mapped to key courses such as "Criminal Law I," "Digital Evidence," and the "Law of Evidence," addressing local, national, and global needs. The session not only enhanced the students' legal knowledge but also contributed to skill development in the fields of criminal law and digital forensics, aligning with Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 16, which promotes peace, justice, and strong institutions. By focusing on the evolving challenges of cybercrime and the importance of digital evidence, the event prepared students for future legal careers, enhancing their employability in a rapidly changing digital landscape.




Crime Scene Investigation



Forensics CIA Crime Scene Investigation January 18, 2024

The Advanced Criminal Law Studies Committee at the School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organized a workshop titled "Forensics CIA Crime Scene Investigation" on January 18, 2024. This hands-on session, specifically designed for fourth-year law students and those pursuing forensic science electives, focused on developing essential crime scene investigation skills. The workshop engaged 50 participants, who were given access to a staged crime scene to practice evidence collection, documentation, and witness examination. Through this experience, students learned the practical application of legal principles and forensic techniques crucial for criminal investigations.





Participants were tasked with meticulously examining the crime scene, collecting physical and documentary evidence, and creating sketches and photographs to support their findings. Additionally, they conducted witness interviews, honing their ability to gather information effectively. The evidence gathered was analyzed to create comprehensive reports, allowing students to exercise critical thinking and evidence evaluation. By presenting their findings, participants polished their skills in articulating arguments and presenting legal reports—abilities crucial for future careers in criminal law and law enforcement.



This workshop not only contributed to the development of practical legal skills but also aligned with Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 16, which promotes justice and strong institutions. The experiential learning provided by this activity enhanced the employability of the participants, preparing them for real-world legal challenges. Through the hands-on approach, students gained a deeper understanding of the role of crime scene investigations in the broader context of law enforcement, demonstrating the importance of precision, attention to detail, and ethical considerations in criminal justice.




Internal Trial Ranking Rounds



Internal Trial Ranking Rounds September 30, 2023 CHRIST (Deemed to be University

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, organized the Internal Trial Ranking Rounds (ITRR) on September 30, 2023. This activity aimed to evaluate and rank students' trial advocacy skills, with a focus on selecting teams for national and international trial competitions. A total of 87 shortlisted students participated in the rounds, which tested their abilities in various aspects of a criminal trial, such as opening statements, examination-in-chief, cross-examination, and closing arguments. The event was judged by a panel of 16 legal professionals, including experienced advocates and corporate lawyers.



The ITRR was structured into two primary rounds. The judges were briefed from 230 to 330 PM, followed by the first round from 330 to 430 PM, where participants demonstrated their knowledge of procedural, evidentiary, and ethical requirements in criminal trials. The second round, held from 500 to 600 PM, assessed the participants on their ability to handle evidence, mark exhibits, and cross-examine witnesses



effectively. The ranking rounds provided an immersive platform for students to refine their legal reasoning, critical thinking, and public speaking skills, which are essential for trial advocacy.



The event concluded with the release of the final rankings and detailed feedback from the judges, offering students constructive insights into their performance. The ITRR not only enhanced students' practical skills but also contributed to their overall professional development, aligning with the Program Outcomes (POs) and Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) of the law curriculum. The focus on skill development and employability ensures that participants are better equipped for future legal challenges, both locally and globally.




National Trial Advocacy And Judgment Writing Competition



9th National Trial Advocacy and Judgment Writing Competition 15th to 17th February 2024.

The 9th National Trial Advocacy and Judgment Writing Competition, hosted by the School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), is set to take place from 15th to 17th February 2024. This national event aims to enhance participants' skills in trial advocacy and judgment writing. The event will be held with support from Live Law as the media partner and SCC Online & Eastern Book Company as the knowledge partners. The competition featured notable dignitaries such as Shri Murthy D. Naik and Shri P. Prasanna Kumar, Senior Advocate of the Karnataka High Court, as chief guests at the inauguration.





Over the course of three days, the competition will include various rounds judged by a distinguished panel of legal experts, including faculty members, practicing advocates, and judges from the High Court of Karnataka. Participants will showcase their advocacy skills through preliminary, quarter-final, semi-final, and final rounds, with the final judgment coming from esteemed High Court judges. This event will see participation from 81 undergraduate law students from across the country, along with a valedictory ceremony attended by 1,200 law students from the host institution.



The primary objective of this event is to promote a trial culture and strengthen criminal litigation skills among law students. Participants will have the opportunity to gain practical experience in courtroom procedures, develop their judgment writing abilities, and enhance their legal knowledge. With its national reach, the competition attracts talented students from various law schools and provides them with a platform to refine their legal expertise, preparing them for future roles in the legal profession.



National Crime Scene Investigation Competition



National Crime Scene Investigation Competition October 16, 2023 Central Campus in Bengaluru

The 1st National Crime Scene Investigation Competition 2023, organized by CHRIST (Deemed to be University), School of Law, took place on October 16, 2023, at the Central Campus in Bengaluru. The event, held in collaboration with the Directorate of Forensic Science Laboratories, Government of Karnataka, provided a platform for law students from across India to engage in practical crime scene investigation exercises. The competition ran from 830 AM to 430 PM, with 139 participants representing 34 teams. Distinguished guests and forensic science experts, including Dr. Vinod J. Lakkappan and Dr. Divya V Gopinath, were present to inaugurate and conclude the event.



During the competition, participants were tasked with investigating crime scenes set up at eight different stalls. Teams were given 20 minutes to examine the scene, gather evidence, and take photographs. Following this, they had 45 minutes to compile detailed



reports based on their observations, which were evaluated by a panel of forensic experts. The event highlighted the importance of critical thinking, unbiased investigation, and the role of forensic science in solving crimes. The competition was a valuable learning experience, combining theoretical knowledge with practical application in a crime scene context.



The event concluded with a valedictory ceremony, where KLE Law College, Bengaluru, won first place, and Kristu Jayanti College of Law was the runner-up. The Chief Guest, Dr. Divya V Gopinath, delivered a closing speech, emphasizing the significance of such competitions in fostering forensic science education. Plans are underway to organize the 2nd National Crime Scene Investigation Competition in 2024, with a focus on enhancing collaboration and sponsorship to further elevate the quality and scope of the event.




Legal Craft Advancing Advocacy Skills Week 2024

On April 5th, the Constitutional Debate was held, where teams debated critical issues such as reservations, citizenship based on religion, and the potential conflict between cultural customs and a uniform civil code. Throughout the week, participants had opportunities to refine their legal drafting, analysis, and public speaking skills.





The event concluded with a Panel Discussion featuring Advocates Aditya Krishna Pandey, Jaibatruka Mohanta, and Anirudh Kulkarni, who provided insights into the real-world challenges of advocacy and legal practice. The week-long event allowed participants to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application, while also networking with legal professionals. Plans are underway to host the 2nd Legal Craft Advancing Advocacy Skills Week in 2025, with a focus on strengthening collaborations and sponsorships to further enhance the event's scope and impact.



Contours Of The Legal Profession A Look Into Prospective Opportunities In The International Domain




Contours of the Legal Profession A Look into Prospective Opportunities in the International Domain

The Workshop on Employability titled "Contours of the Legal Profession A Look into Prospective Opportunities in the International Domain" was held on 2nd September 2023 at the School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bengaluru. The session was conducted by Mr. Arunav Kaul, a Human Rights Lawyer with the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), who shared his expertise with 252 students. The workshop aimed to provide students with a deeper understanding of the scope of International Law and Humanitarian Law, as well as insights into career prospects in the international legal domain.





The speaker highlighted several key areas for students aspiring to enter the global legal profession. These included the availability of international internship opportunities, job prospects in organizations related to international law, and guidance on choosing the right Master's Degree to enhance their employability in this field. The session offered practical advice and strategies for building a successful legal career with an international focus, providing students with a clear road map to explore these opportunities.



Looking ahead, the organizing committee plans to host more sessions, focusing on helping students select suitable Master's programs in International Law. There will also be increased efforts to engage alumni in these initiatives to provide additional support and mentorship to students interested in pursuing international careers. National Event on AI Policy, March 26, 2024 CHRIST (Deemed to be University

The National Event on AI Policy, held at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), School of Law, was a significant event focusing on the ethical dimensions of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in India. The event comprised a panel discussion titled"Navigating the Future Policy Frameworks for Ethical AI in India" and the 1st National Policy Drafting Competition. The panel discussion featured prominent speakers like Mr. Alok Prasanna Kumar from the Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy, Mr. Raghav Muthanna from Indus Law, and Ms. Deepa Padmar, a Research Fellow at Vidhi Centre, with Ms. Aishani Rai from Aapti Institute as the moderator. The discussion, which took place in person and online, explored the rapid growth of AI, its integration into the legal profession, and the need for strong ethical guidelines to govern its use.



During the event, the speakers emphasized the critical role of AI in reshaping the legal landscape, particularly in law firms, and discussed potential policy measures to ensure the responsible and ethical use of this technology. They encouraged students to explore opportunities in technology law, highlighting the increasing career prospects in AI-related fields. Real-life examples of unethical AI usage were shared to stress the importance of regulation, and the speakers referenced the European Union's AI regulations as a model for India to consider. Students were urged to enhance their skills through internships and specialized courses in AI and technology law to stay competitive in this emerging sector.





Following the panel discussion, the 1st National Policy Drafting Competition was held, with 8 teams presenting policy frameworks on AI regulation. The competition was aimed at giving law students practical experience in drafting policies for the evolving field of technology law. The event successfully concluded with the announcement of the competition results and a vote of thanks. Looking ahead, the university plans to continue fostering interest in technology law and policy drafting among students, recognizing the growing importance of these fields in the global legal environment.



The participants also gained exposure to the intricacies of crime scene investigation and how forensic science plays an integral role in legal proceedings.



Notably, the competition highlighted the importance of collaboration, with teams working together to dissect evidence and formulate legal strategies.


Christ University Parliamentary Debate

First Years Debating Premier League




First Years Debating Premier League October 16th to 18th, 2023 CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bengaluru

The Significance Of Economics In Dispute Resolution




THE SIGNIFICANCE OF ECONOMICS IN DISPUTE RESOLUTION




THE ASCENT OF MONEY - A FINANCIAL HISTORY OF THE WORLD DREAMS OF AVARICE.

Handful Of Food




HANDFUL OF FOOD




Glimpses Of Liberty, Equality, And Justice For All




Frontiers Building Respect For Ip

He highlighted the challenges of IP creation and drew inspiration from ancient Indian inventions, offering a deeper understanding of the innovation process and the legal frameworks involved in protecting IP.



On the second day, Dr. Lakshminarayanan R, Director & Head of IP and Innovation Management at Samsung Electronics, delivered a presentation titled "Patent Creation as a Tool to Create Business Impact". His lecture focused on the strategic importance of patents in driving technological innovation and competitiveness. He shared insights into managing IP, identifying patentable ideas, and generating business impact through IP assets. His real-world experiences, including high-profile disputes like Samsung vs.



Apple, provided students with practical knowledge about how companies leverage IP to create value and stay competitive in the tech industry.



Alongside the lectures, interactive stalls were set up on both days to engage the broader university community in understanding IP and competition law. The stalls featured activities such as a GI Tags game, where participants identified the origins of various items, and a Logo Infringement activity, which tested their knowledge of trademark laws. Copyright Pitfalls Of Derived Creativity




Copyright Pitfalls of Derived Creativity.

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), in collaboration with the Office of International Affairs, hosted a seminar on "Copyright Pitfalls of Derived Creativity". The session was led by Dr. Bernd Justin Jütte, an Assistant Professor in Intellectual Property Law at the University College of Dublin. His presentation explored the complexities of copyright law, particularly focusing on issues surrounding derived creativity in the music industry. Through audio comparisons of songs involved in copyright disputes, Dr. Jütte illustrated the intricate legal battles that arise from copyright claims on small audio samples, such as the case of Pelham v. Hütter and Others, where a two-second clip led to 20 years of litigation.





Dr. Jütte's lecture examined the broader implications of copyright law for artistic freedom, shedding light on the challenges and inconsistencies that artists face when navigating intellectual property rights. He discussed key concepts such as Rights and Exceptions to Copyright, and compared several landmark cases, including Andy Warhol Foundation v. Goldsmith Et Al. and Campbell v. Acuff Rose Music Parody Case, to demonstrate how courts have interpreted copyright in different contexts. Through these case studies, he highlighted the tension between artistic creativity and legal protection, prompting thought-provoking discussions among the attendees.



Following the seminar, Dr. Jütte engaged in a conversation with the Director of the School of Law and the Vice Chancellor of CHRIST (Deemed to be University) regarding potential future collaborations. Discussions included the possibility of exchange programs with the University College of Dublin, fostering opportunities for further academic cooperation between the two institutions. The seminar was well-received, with 180 students in attendance, and plans for future international collaborations were set in motion as a result of this enriching event.




Reimaging Forest Governance Appraisal Of The Forest Conservation Amendment Act



Reimaging Forest Governance Appraisal of the Forest Conservation Amendment Act. 6th October 2023

The School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), held a Reading Circle and Discussion Forum titled "Reimaging Forest Governance Appraisal of the Forest Conservation Amendment Act 2023". The session, which took place in Room 408, was led by Aleena Annabelly, a final-year law student. Eleven participants, all students, gathered to discuss the implications of the newly amended Act, using an article by Prof. Sairam Bhat as the foundation for the conversation. The primary objective was to critically analyze the potential benefits and drawbacks of the Forest Conservation Amendment Act 2023 in preserving Indian forests.



The discussion kicked off with the participants collectively reading the article, which offered an overview of the historical evolution of forest conservation regulations in India. Three key questions based on the article were posed by the facilitator, prompting participants to explore the intricate balance between forest conservation and economic development, and the challenges posed by varying levels of development across different countries. The group also scrutinized the Act's definition of "forest," which they believed was narrow and could open the door to exploitation. Additionally, the arbitrary allocation of funds for National Security purposes within the Act was also a point of debate.





In conclusion, the participants engaged in a dynamic debate from multiple perspectives before reaching a consensus on the topics discussed. The reading circle allowed for an in-depth exploration of the Forest Conservation Amendment Act 2023, encouraging students to reflect on how forest governance in India can be reimagined. The event successfully fostered critical thinking and encouraged active participation, highlighting the importance of finding a balance between environmental conservation and economic growth.








Menstrual Leave Policy Making




Menstrual Leave Policy Making 5th March 2024, Room 911, Central Block




National Essay Writing Competition




Virtual National Legal-Techathon


National Video Making Competition




Workshop On Skill Development




Visit To The Central Prison, Parappana Agrahara.

Central Prison, Parappana Agrahara

The School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bengaluru, organized a prison visit to the Central Prison, Parappana Agrahara. The visit aimed to enhance students' understanding of trial advocacy skills by exposing them to the real-life conditions and operations of a prison facility. A total of 330 participants, including faculty members, students, and prison authorities, attended the two-day event. The visit was conducted in collaboration with the Department of Prisons and Correctional Centre, Government of Karnataka. The participants observed various units within the prison, including the barracks for undertrial and convicted prisoners, the bakery unit, textile manufacturing unit, soap production unit, and the kitchen. Female students were also given access to the women's prison for a more comprehensive understanding.



The students underwent three rounds of security checks before entering the facility. Once inside, they were shown how the prison is largely self-sufficient with its in-house production units, including those for textiles, soap, and bakery products. They also visited the prison library, which was well-stocked with academic and non-academic literature. One of the highlights of the visit was an instrumental music performance by inmates, who had been trained at the Bengaluru Central Music School, showcasing the



prison's efforts toward rehabilitation and reform. The women's prison, a smaller facility with no segregation between undertrial and convicted prisoners, was visited by the female students.

The visit provided a first-hand experience of the infrastructure and operations of the prison, allowing students to critically examine the living conditions of inmates and the reformative activities in place. 


Zero Recruitment Interviews


Empowering Wellness Embracing The Right To Health For All.




Exploring Career Pathways In-House Counsel Roles






Lean Six Sigma Competency Development Programme

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) organized a seminar titled "Lean Six Sigma Competency Development Programme" in collaboration with KPMG. The event, held at Skyview, Central Block, aimed to familiarize students with Lean Six Sigma, a methodology developed to address cost management and process improvement. The seminar featured presentations from key KPMG professionals, including Mr. Jagpreet Brar, Director of Learning Services; Mr. Venu Nilgar, Associate Director; Mr. Sahil Nayar, Senior Associate Director of Human Resources; and Mr. Sarthak Shukla, Assistant Manager. The session was attended by 385 students from the 4th year B.A. LLB (Hons), B.B.A. LLB (Hons), and LLM programs.



The speakers elaborated on the core concepts of the Lean Six Sigma Competency Development Programme, a course designed to equip participants with the tools and knowledge needed for waste reduction, process control, and sustainable improvements. They explained how Lean Six Sigma applies across various industries and sectors, enhancing operational efficiency, agility, and compliance with existing systems. 
Industrial Visit To Stovekraft



Industrial Visit To Stovekraft


8th September 2023 StoveKraft, 3rd Block, 297, 10th Main, Bengaluru

The exploration of key legal documents, such as Shareholder Agreements (SHA), Share Subscription Agreements (SSA), and Sale and Purchase Agreements (SPA), was a highlight, offering participants the skills necessary for successful investment management.





The course provided a detailed understanding of the differences between private equity and venture capital, covered critical aspects of the deal cycle, and emphasized the importance of legal due diligence and regulatory considerations. It introduced participants to negotiation strategies for securing favorable investment terms and provided a comprehensive overview of legal documents essential for PE/VC transactions. Key takeaways included the significance of understanding the deal cycle, the importance of legal and regulatory knowledge, the critical role of due diligence, and the value of negotiation skills for maintaining healthy investor relationships.


12th Edition Of Its National-Level Model United Nations (Mun) Conference.




Career Prospects In The Regulatory Sector


Introduction To Model United Nations (Mun)




Article 370 Of The Constitution.



Article 370 of the Constitution January 6, 2024 Room 409, Central Block

The School of Law hosted a workshop titled "In Re. Article 370 of the Constitution" in Room 409, Central Block. This session was conducted by Prof. Vetha Philos, Assistant Professor at the School of Law, who provided an in-depth analysis of the legal and constitutional implications surrounding the abrogation of Article 370. The workshop was attended by 25 BA LLB and BBA LLB students, focusing on the historical context and the procedural issues associated with the revocation of this article.



The discussion highlighted the complexities and criticisms related to the abrogation of Article 370, initially designed to address the unique circumstances of Jammu and Kashmir and maintain a federal balance. Prof. Philos critiqued the 2019 abrogation for bypassing constitutional procedures, particularly the dissolution of the Jammu & Kashmir Constituent Assembly in 1956, which undermined the legitimacy of the revocation. Additionally, the workshop examined the procedural irregularities of Constitutional Orders, specifically CO 273, which did not follow the required ratification processes.





The workshop concluded that the abrogation of Article 370 and the subsequent reorganization of Jammu and Kashmir into Union Territories were constitutionally flawed, posing potential threats to India's federal structure. The session emphasized the need for adherence to constitutional mans and provided students with a critical perspective on the legal and procedural aspects of such significant constitutional changes.




Granville Austin And The Making Of India's Constitution

It was noted that Austin's work has been instrumental not only in legal circles but also in parliamentary discussions on public institutions. 


Exploring The Contours Of The Doctrine Of Basic Structure



Exploring the Contours of the Doctrine of Basic Structure July 27, 2023 911 CB

A workshop on constitutional skills titled "Exploring the Contours of the Doctrine of Basic Structure" was conducted at 911 CB from 1200 to 100 PM. The speaker for the event was Dr. Sanjay Jain, a Professor at the National Law School of India University, Bangalore. Despite being visually impaired, Dr. Jain's entrance was met with warm applause, setting the tone for an insightful lecture on one of the most important doctrines in Indian constitutional law. His discussion spanned the historical development, key criticisms, and future implications of the Basic Structure Doctrine.

He explored how other democratic countries approach similar doctrines and emphasized the importance of dynamic constitutionalism in modern governance. His lecture



illuminated the complexities of the Basic Structure Doctrine, and his critical analysis provided students with fresh angles to consider on this foundational topic of constitutional law.

The event concluded smoothly, with Dr. Jain being honored with a memento and a vote of thanks. The LLM students, in particular, benefited from his thought-provoking insights. The School of Law plans to maintain collaboration with Dr. Jain to continue enriching the intellectual landscape for future batches. Recognizing the essential nature of constitutional understanding for all law students, the School aims to host many more such lectures in the future.




Disputes Practice In A Firm

Legal Aid and Para Legal Services Skills

A workshop on "Legal Aid and Para Legal Services Skills" was held on the 5th and 6th of August, 2023 at Kolathur Village, Srinivasapura Taluk, Kolar District. Organized in collaboration with the Karnataka State Legal Service Authority (KSLSA) and the District Legal Service Authority (DLSA), Kolar, the event was aimed at creating legal awareness among the rural community. The workshop featured insightful presentations by Honourable Justice Sri Manu B K, Principal Civil Judge, Judicial Magistrate of First Class, and Sri Jayarame Gowda, President of the Taluk Bar Association, among others. Both days were structured around a blend of legal teaching, rallies, cultural programs, and house-to-house surveys conducted by final-year law students from the university.



Day 1 began with a rally to raise awareness about the importance of legal aid, followed by a cultural program where students performed skits and dances to illustrate socio-legal issues, such as the NDPS Act and the Rights of Senior Citizens. These activities served to engage the village community, offering them a basic understanding of their legal rights and responsibilities. Day 2 focused on a village-wide survey conducted by the students, who collected data on legal issues faced by the villagers. The



survey highlighted significant challenges, including the lack of birth certificates for 135 village residents, which was discussed in the official program.



The workshop not only provided a practical learning opportunity for the students but also brought tangible legal support to the rural community. The event concluded with a session by Justice Manu B K, where the final survey results were shared. The initiative was a resounding success, showcasing how legal aid can contribute to the empowerment of rural communities. The School of Law intends to continue similar programs in the future to enhance legal awareness and community development.




Cjc Teaching Workshop On Legal Aid Skills



CJC Teaching Workshop on Legal Aid Skills 11th of December 2023 Christ Residential PU College

The *CJC Teaching Workshop* on Legal Aid Skills was held on the 11th December 2023 at Christ Residential PU College, Kengeri Campus. This interactive session was attended by 1,700 students from 1st and 2nd PU, with the primary goal of fostering a legal mindset among young learners. The workshop covered several key legal topics including the Constitution of India, The Motor Vehicles (Amendment) Act, 2019, The Consumer Protection Act, 2019, The Right to Information Act, 2005, and the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985. Student volunteers from the School of Law collaborated in teams to lead discussions in different classrooms, ensuring active engagement.



Throughout the workshop, students were introduced to essential legal concepts that impact their daily lives. The Constitution of India, as the fundamental law of the nation, was explained with an emphasis on the rights and duties it enshrines. Topics like the Motor Vehicles Act and the NDPS Act were explored to highlight the importance of legal compliance and the consequences of violations. 


Teaching Workshop for the students

The School of Law at CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore, conducted a *Teaching Workshop* for the students of Christ Junior College and Christ PU College. The workshop was split into two sessions – one for the morning college from 11 am to 12 pm and another for the evening college from 1 pm to 2 pm. Over 1,461 students attended the event, where they were introduced to significant legal concepts, including The Constitution of India, The Motor Vehicles (Amendment) Act, The Consumer Protection Act, The Right to Information Act, and The Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act. The primary aim was to foster a general awareness of legal rights and responsibilities among young students.


