





3. Documentary Screening & Talk:

A student from the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Assam, presented a documentary on Dailong village in Manipur and the Raengaan grove. The talk illustrated the harmonious relationship between the Rongmei community and the forests, highlighting the importance of preserving indigenous knowledge.

4. Natural History Workshop:

A naturalist couple from Satpura Tiger Reserve led a workshop exploring natural history, including the fascinating Gerard house gecko. The session emphasized citizen science and the use of spider diagrams to understand wildlife better.

5. Sacred Fungi Talk:

Fungi enthusiasts from Himachal Pradesh discussed the ecological significance of mushrooms, including their roles in decomposition, symbiosis, and parasitism. The audience learned about mushroom identification and its sensory importance in ecosystems.


6. Cultural Performance:












ABOUT SDG CELL, CHRIST (DEEMED TO BE UNIVERSITY)
