#### **Workshop Summary**


The SDG Cell of the School of Commerce, Finance, and Accountancy has conducted a workshop titled "Violence Against Children" on 3<sup>rd</sup> October 2023 for School Students. The workshop was organized with the objective of raising awareness, providing information, and promoting a safe and supportive environment for children, empowering them to protect themselves against violence.

The workshop covered a range of important topics related to violence against children, including Introduction to Violence Against Children, and Types of Violence (including bullying, domestic violence, and cyberbullying, with real-life examples to help students understand these concepts better), Identifying Signs of Violence i.e., How to recognize signs of violence in themselves and their peers and why reporting is essential., Strategies and tips for preventing violence and staying safe, both online and offline.


The student coordinators also explained the role of trusted adults to the students by emphasizing the importance of confiding in trusted adults, such as parents, teachers, or counsellors, when they face any form of violence. They have also performed engaging activities, role-plays, and group discussions to encourage active participation and reinforce the workshop's key messages.

The students left the workshop with improved awareness of violence against children, a better understanding of how to recognize signs of violence, and knowledge about preventive strategies for personal safety. Additionally, they gained a greater understanding of the significance of reporting incidents to trusted adults and authorities, along with information on reporting mechanisms.

The students have provided positive feedback on the workshop, expressing increased awareness and a greater willingness to seek help when faced with violence or bullying. In conclusion, the "Violence Against Children" workshop was a successful and impactful event that we hope will contribute to creating a safer environment for children in our community. The workshop ended by 12:30 p.m.

#### Summary of the activity

The event began with the address given by Dr. Chaitanya who highlighted the inherent presence of conflict in a democratic society. He highlighted the pejorative charge which is juxtaposed with the idea of politics. He posited that democracy was not an end but a means. Politics can be present in institutions which may not be deemed to be public institutions. One's understanding of politics is determined by the ideology one subscribes to.

The welcome address was given by Dr. Venkatanarayan S who stressed on the importance of dissent in politics. Politics gives us the chance to express our consent on many occasions through voting. However, in the wake of glaring inequalities and democratic erosion the importance of dissent has increased.

The address by Dr. MJ Vinod revolved around the different trajectories of democratic development in different countries. There is no one size fits all approach during the process of democratization. The involvement of people in the process of democratization is the most significant. He highlighted the difference between the maximalist and minimalist democracy. A minimalist democracy emphasises on the procedural aspect of democracy which rests on reliance on the rules and structures. A maximalist democracy essentially entails a realisation of the foundational values of a nation. He underscores the importance of not

compartmentalizing countries into different categories like a 'failed state' or 'an autocratic dictatorship'. Hence, the process of democratization is not a linear process. He underscored the importance of a deliberative democracy in questioning an unjust order. Deliberation may not always produce just outcomes and just outcomes can be produced without the need for deliberation. Instrumental and expressive aspects of deliberation must be reconciled rather than viewing them as binaries.

The activity to prepare posters about various various democratic values helped them to conflate their understanding of democracy with creative expression. They were asked to choose a theme and prepare a collage on that theme. They were free to use newspaper cuttings. The objective was to relate theories of democracy to daily life incidents to garner a broader perspective of decision making process

Workshop Outcome:

On 29th April 2023, we prepared a wall of democracy as a workshop outcome, from all the posters which we made in the workshop. We displayed all our posters in the quadrangle, and gave a presentation about the posters. As we know our country is one significant example of democratic governance, we explained the significance of democracy to other students and spread knowledge about that. We even talked about various topics on which we made our posters, such as Human rights, accountability, secularism, fraternity, Equality, Justice etc.

The event in the quadrangle started with a song sung by Anshumani gangdeb and Anjini Chakroborty, followed by the dance performance by Natasha Baruah. After the performances, we gave our presentation of the wall of democracy and asked other students to tell their understanding about democracy and give reviews about the event. Hereby we ended our workshop on democracy.



# Summary of the Activity

The Street Play Competition started with emcees: Muskan and Adwitya conducting a small activity amongst the audience to reveal the theme, followed by the introduction of the judges and the guidelines of the competition. The street play competition consisted of four teams: Jyoti Nivas College, Team Actomanics (Christ University), Kalavidaru (National College), and Dramatic Draupadi (St. Joseph College). Each team had to perform for 10 minutes, keeping specific rules and regulations in mind. The theme of the competition was "Communal Harmony." Every team had different perspectives, but, in the end, they clearly delivered the message that there is harmony in togetherness. The play by St. Joseph's college emphasized on the neglected rights and unfair treatment of the Transgender community and highlighted Transgender Protection Act 2019 to create awareness about the law. National college focused on becoming inclusive for the minorities (Muslims) in our society. Overall, the street plays encouraged peace and harmony amongst the different genders, religions, castes, etc., that exist in our society.



#### **Description and Objective:**

Mukthi Bike Challenge (conducted from 29 October 2022 to 4 November 2022) was a weeklong event organized by the NGO Oasis-India. This bike challenge focused on spreading awareness about human trafficking and its forms as these trivial issues require attention and need to be talked about out loud. Drishti, the theater wing of CSA accompanied Oasis-India and performed street plays in 13 different locations from Bangalore to Miraj (Maharashtra).

#### Impact on the community:

- 1. We were able to sensitise people on the trivial issue of human trafficking and its forms like child labour, child and sexual abuse, and more.
- 2. We sensitised the general public about what should be done if they encounter such situations through street plays.
- 3. The performances that took place in the government schools and colleges sensitised the students about the possibilities of a kidnapping.
- 4. Since the play was performed in so many locations, Drishti was able to reach out to a wider audience across India.

#### **Volunteer learnings:**

- 1. The volunteers were exposed to harsher and unpredictable situations and were able to understand and navigate through crisis situations better.
- 2. The volunteers got the opportunity to understand the severity of human trafficking.
- 3. The volunteers got better exposure to street plays and developed their theatre skills.
- 4. The event brought in a sense of concern about the ones that get trapped in this vicious cycle and lit a fire in the volunteers to work for the cause.



| Summary of the Activity | October 4 is celebrated as World Animal Day. The workshop emphasised on spreading awareness about the protection of wild animals. The workshop started with a discussion about the legal reforms regarding the protection of wildlife. The main concern expressed was regarding the alarming increase in wildlife crime. The number of tigers has declined from 80,000 to 3500. The Wildlife Protection Act came into force in the year 1972, which is considered as one of the strongest and most regulated legislation however, it only concerns the protection of native wildlife and lacks clarity regarding exotic animals. The lacunae would be fulfilled by enactment of new legislation, that is, Wildlife Protection Amendment Bill, 2021, that would be implemented by the end of next month. It consists of all the provisions that would regulate the possession, breeding and trade of exotic species.  The awareness session also provided insights on why wildlife trafficking is considered as a serious issue. It also pointed out the negative impact of social media on trade of exotic animals as it encouraged worldwide trade on these species.  The workshop also provided an understanding regarding the contribution that can be given on the part of responsible citizens. This can be done with the help of better education, awareness programmes and better legislation and policies. |



# Summary of the Activity

## Day 1

The day began with Ms. Mridula V. giving a presentation on the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972 and the various crimes it identifies. Through an interactive session, and various exercises, she taught the participants how to correctly reconcile the legal crime mentioned in the Act with the crime committed on the ground by perusing the Act's definitions and comparing them to the various crimes that take place. She then briefly illustrated the various powers and procedures followed by the Forest Department personnel.

After lunch, Mr. Charan Tej gave a presentation on the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act by focusing on the controversial *jallikattu* case of Tamil Nadu- *Animal Welfare Board of India v. Nagaraja*- the various arguments of the stakeholders in the case and the politics behind it all.

Next, Dr. Shampa Dev presented the jurisprudence of animal welfare- leaving the participants pondering the possibility of bestowing legal personality upon animals, whether it would reduce wildlife crime and how the same may be enforced

Lastly, Ms. Samyukta C. briefly took the participants through the various forensic methods used in the litigation of wildlife crime, what documents need to be filed and how they must be accomplished. She stressed on how the species of the animal in question makes or breaks a case and related the same to the Wildlife Conservation Act as presented by her colleague.

#### Day 2

The day began with a 3-hour road trip to the Cauvery Wildlife Sanctuary and a stop for breakfast on the way. Upon reaching the Sanctuary, the various guests were felicitated post which, Mr. Shashi Kumar, the Range Forest Officer gave a presentation on the Cauvery Wildlife Sanctuary. Through an interactive session, he briefed the participants about the various challenged faced by the forest department- from forest fires and illegal entry and poaching to human-wildlife conflict.

Next, Mr. Santosh, the DCF gave a presentation illustrating various points in his own career and of his current post and how they have aided him in discharging his duties as the Deput Conservator of Forests. Through an interactive session he

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# HISTORY OF LEGAL AID AND AWARENESS COMMITTEE

The Legal Awareness and Aid Committee, School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), is among the 28 committees in the School of Law, which caters to the all-round development of its students. The committee acts as an instrument in ensuring that the social objectives and aims of the institution are pursued and achieved.

The Legal Awareness and Aid Committee on behalf of CHRIST (Deemed to be University) entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on 25th July 2015 for a period of 10 years, with the Karnataka State Legal Services Authority (KSLSA) to act in furtherance of the University's social objectives. The MoU enjoins adopting villages and spreading legal awareness through camps, rallies and other activities. The MoU also aims at setting up legal aid clinics in the adopted villages.

Section 4(k) of the Legal Services Authorities Act 1987 mandates the National Legal Services Authority to develop, in consultation with the Bar Council of India, programs for clinical legal education and promote, guide and supervise the establishment and working of Legal Services Clinics in Universities and Law Colleges. The National Legal Services Authority has already notified the National Legal Services Authority (Legal Aid Clinics) Regulations, 2011, regulations 22 to 26 of which are applicable to Student Legal Aid Clinics.

- Melluru village, Muthuru gramapanchayati, Shidilghatta Taluk, Chikkabalpur District, Karanataka.

Village adopted for the Legal Services Clinic set up in 2021: Yalachamanahalli Village, Hosakote Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District, Karnataka.

The Committee was presented with an Award at the 4th National Conference on Gender Justice and Human Rights held at Delhi on 20th January 2020 by "Knowledge Steez", an institution working in the field of Legal Aid and Social Awareness, recognizing the work of the committee in favour of the poor and deprived classes of Karnataka. The Legal Aid and Awareness Committee of the School of Law has also been recognized as one of the ten best legal aid societies in India. This gesture has encouraged the Committee to work furthermore towards the betterment of the deprived classes of rural Karnataka.

The Legal Aid and Awareness Committee, on the 9th of October, 2021, established a Legal Services Clinic at School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), in association with the KSLSA. The village allotted by the KSLSA for the same was Yalachamanahalli Village, Hoskote Taluk, Bangalore Rural District. The inaugural function was presided over by Hon'ble Justice Mr. Aravind Kumar of the High Court of Karnataka. Other guests of honour were, Dr. Fr. Abraham V.M, Vice-Chancellor, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Dr. Fr. Benny Thomas, Director, School of Law, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Shri Shashidhar Shetty, Member-Secretary, KSLSA and Shri Shridhar Prabhu, Advocate and non-official member, KSLSA.

#### AIM AND OBJECTIVE BEHIND EACH INITIATIVE/ACTIVITY

#### 1. Legal Aid and Awareness Camps

The committee in association with Karnataka State Legal Services Authority conducts 6 legal aid camps every year with the objective of spreading legal awareness and also providing the villagers with an opportunity to address their concerns with Judges and members of the gram panchayat. The students conduct a survey of the village, the data collected being provided to the legal services authority for further action.

#### 2. Teaching Program

The teaching program conducted in government schools and private colleges aim at creating awareness in basic legal concepts of utmost importance including Right to Education, Domestic Violence, Child Marriage, Child Sexual Abuse and Rights of Senior Citizens. The members prepare PowerPoint presentations for the same and the topics were explained in Kannada by adopting student- friendly techniques. The Committee distributed educational pamphlets and performed skits on child marriage, importance of taking care of parents and senior citizens, and domestic violence.

#### 3. Jan Sunwaii

The aim of Jansunwaii was to provide a medium through which villagers address their concerns to the authorities without any intermediaries and seek legal advice and also a solution to other social problems. The Panel consists of Judges, Gram panchayat members and members of the Legal Services Authority. The committee then submits the queries and complaints to concerned authorities.

#### 4. Lok Adalat Visit

The committee organises visits to the Monthly National Lok Adalats, with an intention of furthering practical knowledge and promoting ADR mechanisms of dispute settlements amongst law students. The students of 5th year B.A. LLB. And B.B.A. LL.B., are taken to the Monthly National Lok Adalats held at the High Court of Karnataka, City Civil Court, Mayo Hall, Labour Court and Family Court.

#### 5. Street Play

The committee performs skits and plays in regional languages with an intention to spread awareness on basic rights and laws necessary to the general public. The skits are generally performed in economically backward areas such as slums. Visual art has more impact than oral or written words which is what the committee uses as a medium to attract more people and create awareness.

#### 6. Adalat Proceedings

Litigation is a cumbersome and time consuming process especially considering the economic status of the villagers. With an aim of promoting alternate dispute resolution mechanisms, the committee conducts mediation proceedings in the villages in association with the Taluk and District Legal Services Authority.

#### WORK DONE AS A PART OF EACH INITIATIVE/ACTIVITY

#### 1. CAMPS

Access to justice is one of the most crucial aspects of a democracy. Rule of law enables citizens to voice out their concern, enforce their rights and privileges. In order to achieve a state consisting of an informed citizenry, not only access to justice but also awareness about the laws is quintessential. Through Legal aid and awareness camps we are able to provide the rural people awareness about their entitlements under various enactments, welfare schemes and programs in order to strengthen their access to the same. With the prime objective of helping in the creation of an informed citizenry, the Legal Aid and Awareness Committee in association with Karnataka State Legal Services Authority organises legal aid camps in various remote villages in Karnataka.

Members of the committee along with 5<sup>th</sup>-year law students and LLM students conduct surveys to assess the level of legal awareness among the villagers and to bring forward any legal and social concerns they have, teach the children of Government primary and high school students about the Indian Constitution, the Right to Information, Consumer rights, and the Right to education. Skits and mimes are presented on these topics to sensitize the villagers about these legal rights and other legal issues like sexual harassment, unemployment, child marriage, school dropouts, and environmental protection.

Official program is also hosted, presided by Judges, Gram Panchayat members and other persons from the legal fraternity who talk extensively on the basic rights available to the people and also set the objective of the camp in order to facilitate better communication between the students and the villagers. The camp provides the villagers with an opportunity to address their grievances directly to the authorities and also seek any advice on matters of legal importance.

This academic year, the committee conducted 6 camps with 380 students and 40 members. The camps were conducted across Karnataka, the villages as follows:

- 1. Tarur Village, Sira Taluk, Tumkur District
- 2. Tharikere Village, Kunigal Taluk, Tumkur District
- 3. Allalasandra Village, Koratagere Taluk, Tumkur District

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# **ACTIVITIES OF THE CAMP**

#### Official Program

The official program is graced by Judges, Judges, Gram Panchayat members and other authorities such as the Block Education Officer, Panchayat Development Officer and others. The program was inaugurated by lighting the lamp. This was followed by the dignitaries addressing the audience with their enriching words and sharing their views about legal aid and its importance, this was a motivation to the students and informative for the villagers. There was an interactive session conducted for the villagers which was the most significant part of the official program. This gave an opportunity to the villagers to ask about their doubts regarding legal concepts and also raise queries and grievances related to other social problems such as sanitation, health care facilities and more.





#### **SURVEY**

The main aspect of the camp is the survey. The objective of the survey is to determine the villagers' level of legal awareness and to acquaint them with various legal concepts such as free legal aid, consumer rights, right to education etc. The questionnaire consists of 15 questions covering various aspects such as legal awareness, necessary documents for vehicles, Aadhar cards, Voter ID, awareness about government schemes, and other Socio-Legal issues which are to be addressed. Further, questions relating to basic facilities of access to clean drinking water, sanitation, and transport were asked. The students are divided into groups of 6 or 7, with each group accompanied by 2 committee members for conducting the survey in an efficient manner. The survey is conducted primarily in kannada and other regional languages that the villages are acquainted with. Every group compiled their survey and a consolidated report of the entire village survey was formed. The families and individuals eligible for free legal aid were identified. The students also discussed the socio-legal issues that villagers faced. The people of the village were extremely welcoming and the queries put forth by them were taken note of. Households requiring legal assistance were identified during the survey and their forms were reserved for future action.





#### **Cultural Program**

The cultural program includes the educational performances by the students and the committee members who perform skits and mimes on topics of utmost basic importance such as right to education, domestic violence, NDPS Act, rights of senior citizens etc. The skits are also followed by dance performances by the students. The children of the Government Schools are also invited to participate in the cultural program.



Camp 1: Tarur Village, Sira Taluk, Tumkur District




The first day of the legal awareness camp began with the teaching program for the students of Tarur and Bramhasandra government schools. The following topics were covered:

- Domestic Violence
- Child Abuse
- Child Marriage
- Rights Of Senior Citizens
- Consumer Protection
- Right To Education
- Good Touch And Bad Touch (Child Sexual Abuse)



The objective of the survey was to determine the villagers' level of legal awareness and to acquaint them with various legal concepts such as free legal aid, consumer rights, right to

education etc. The questionnaire consisted of 15 questions covering various aspects such as legal awareness, necessary documents for vehicles, Aadhar cards, Voter ID, awareness about government schemes, and other Socio-Legal issues which are to be addressed. 

Camp 2: Tharikere Village, Kunigal Taluk, Tumkur District



A total of 69 houses were surveyed. Each group compiled its findings and a final report for the entire village was prepared which is as follows:



After a detailed analysis of the survey, it was observed that the people had a fair idea about the basic policies like free education & property rights of women. It was also inferred that though the general population was aware of most of the rights, they were not able to access them. The majority was not aware of the concept of free legal aid and Lok Adalat. Most of the villagers possessed basic documents such as Aadhar Cards and Voter IDs, but the majority of them did not have birth certificates and senior citizen cards.

Mentioning the social concerns about the village, the basic needs and facilities are in need of improvement; the primary healthcare & sewage facilities are absent and the transportation facilities is also a major area of concern as the frequency of getting public transport is poor.



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#### Camp 3: Allalasandra Village, Koratagere Taluk, Tumkur District

A total of 71 houses were surveyed. Each group compiled its findings and a final report for the entire village was prepared and it is as follows:



After a detailed analysis of the survey, it was observed that the people had a rough idea about the basic policies and existing laws and their corresponding rights like Swachh Bharat, free education & property rights of women. It was also inferred that though the general population was aware of most of the rights, they were not able to access them. The majority was not aware of the concept of free legal aid and Lok Adalat. Despite having a rudimentary knowledge of such laws, most households lacked important documents such as Birth certificates, marriage certificates.

Mentioning the social concerns about the village, the basic needs and facilities are in need of improvement; the primary healthcare & sewage facilities are absent and the transportation facilities is also a major area of concern as the frequency of getting public transport is poor.


The prominent areas which required attention were:

Camp 4: Chikka Kadathur Village, Malur Taluk, Kolar District



The final year law students were divided into several groups and each group was assisted by 1 committee member (volunteer) to help the students in conducting the survey in an efficient manner. The main intent of the survey was to identify the social and legal problems, check whether every individual has availed the mandatory government identity proofs such as Aadhar Card, Pan Card. Etc. and the most important part, educating every household, every individual about the basic laws that a common man should be aware of, and about government schemes and services that would benefit every individual. Another important part of this survey was to identify the residents who were eligible for free legal aid and who were in need of free legal aid and services. The villagers' awareness about the basic laws was examined and the students educated them with those laws which they were not aware of. The laws/concepts that were covered during the process were:



A total of 74 houses were surveyed. Each group compiled its findings and a final report for the entire village was prepared and it is as follows:

After a detailed analysis of the survey, it was observed that the people had a fair idea about the basic policies like Swachh Bharat, free education & property rights of women. It was also inferred that though the general population was aware of most of the rights, they were not able to access them. The majority was not aware of the concept of free legal aid and Lok Adalat. Most of the villagers possessed basic documents such as Aadhar Cards and Voter IDs, but the majority of them did not have birth certificates and senior citizen cards.

Mentioning the social concerns about the village, the basic needs and facilities are in need of improvement; the primary healthcare & sewage facilities are absent and the transportation facilities is also a major area of concern as the frequency of getting public transport is poor.

The prominent areas which required attention were:



Camp 5: Avalagurki Village, Chikkaballapura Taluk, Chikkaballapura

A total of 74 houses were surveyed. Each group compiled its findings and a final report for the entire village was prepared and it is as follows:



After a detailed analysis of the survey, it was observed that the people had a fair idea about the basic policies like Swachh Bharat, free education & property rights of women. It was also inferred that though the general population was aware of most of the rights, they were not able to access them. The majority was not aware of the concept of free legal aid and Lok Adalat. Most of the villagers possessed basic documents such as Aadhar Cards and Voter IDs, but the majority of them did not have birth certificates and senior citizen cards.

Mentioning the social concerns about the village, the basic needs and facilities are in need of improvement; the primary healthcare & sewage facilities are absent and the transportation facilities is also a major area of concern as the frequency of getting public transport is poor.



Camp 6: Vanakanahalli Village, Anekal Taluk, Bangalore Rural District



A total of 137 houses were surveyed. Each group compiled its findings and a final report for the entire village was prepared and it is as follows:



After a detailed survey and analysis, it was observed that the people of the village had awareness and knowledge about basic welfare schemes and policies of the government and availed them as well. Almost the entire population had a fair idea about Swachh Bharat, free education, maternity benefits, right to education, free education and property rights of women. Many families also sent their children to private schools in spite of there being a free government school in the area; in hopes of securing their children a better education that they themselves received. Majority of the population were not completely aware of concepts of free legal aid and Lok Adalat. A large part of the village population possessed Aadhar cards and Voter IDs, but a larger part of the adult population did not possess Birth Certificates. Many individuals also did not have their marriages registered and did not possess Marriage Certificates.

The villagers did not have many social concerns as they commonly stated that all they received all necessary facilities. They all enjoyed access to clean drinkable water, electricity, public transport and medical services. There was a slight problem in some households in the periphery of the village regarding drainage facilities.

Prominent areas which requires attention were:

- Awareness about Right to free legal aid and Right to Information
- Awareness about Lok Adalat and Mediation
- Awareness about the benefits of senior citizen card
- Awareness of the importance of registering marriages and birth certificates

#### **General Observations of the camps**

A general analysis of the reports shows that many villagers are unaware of the schemes provided by the governments except for a few such as maternity benefit and right to education. The prominent concepts which require the most attention include the right to information, right to free legal aid, Lok Adalats and mediation, rights of senior citizens and also the need for labour cards. Even though most of them had knowledge about the need for a driving licence, insurance and more, there was a collective ignorance towards them.

With regard to social problems, most villages had good public transport facilities but lacked basic sanitation and primary healthcare facilities. The villagers have to travel towards the towns and cities for availing even the most basic health facilities and there was considerable ignorance of the authorities towards the drainage and sewage systems.

#### 2. JAN SUNWAII

The Jan Sunwaii was conducted on the 10th of September 2022 in Tarur village of Tumkur district. The panel consisting of the following was constituted for this purpose:

• Shri Sandesh, Principal Civil Judge, Sira Taluk;

- Shri Nagaraj, Advocate, Tumkur District Legal Services Authority;
- Shri Lokesh, President, Tarur Gram Panchayat;
- Shri Nagraj, Member, Tarur Gram Panchayat
- Ms Shivani, Advocate, Tumkur District Court and
- Dr Mallaiah MR, Coordinator, School of Law Christ University

A huge number of villagers who were gathered for the program were first introduced to the concept of Jan Sunwaii in the context of legal aid and were made comfortable to speak about legal issues or crisis faced with. Among the various issues that were brought up before the panel, some prominent issues brought out were regarding the local authorities' inefficiency and the lack of public infrastructure in the village. The panel addressed all the issues with utmost patience and understanding of the mindset of the aggrieved person.

#### 3. VILLAGE ADALAT

The Committee conducted three Village Adalat sessions on the 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> of October 2022 in Brahmasandra village, Sira Taluk, Tumkur district of Karnataka. The Committee chose mediation as the mode of dispute resolution in the village Adalat proceedings to amicably settle issues among the residents and conducted three sessions for the same. The proceedings took place in a Government School in Brahmasandra village. The parties were made aware of the village Adalat proceedings by Advocate Shivani, Advocate Madhu, Advocate M. S. Jaggadish, and Advocate B. Ranganath, accredited mediators from Sira Taluk Mediation Centre and parties seeking to settle their disputes arrived at the venue of the village Adalat.

#### 4. SPEED MENTORING

A Teaching Programme session was conducted on 27<sup>th</sup> August 2022 with 22 volunteers in three government schools of Anekal Taluk, Bengaluru Rural District. The main objective of this session was to make the students aware of the basic concepts of law. The session lasted for 2 hours, and student-centric teaching techniques were adopted. The Committee members performed skits on the rights of senior citizens, domestic violence and child marriage, among others. Furthermore, quizzes were conducted for the students, and they were quizzed on general knowledge and current affairs. The Committee distributed pamphlets to the students on the Right to Education and the Preamble to the Indian Constitution.





The committee also conducted a teaching program at Christ Junior College, Bangalore for the students of 2nd PUC. The members were divided into pairs engaging each class, a total of 15

classes and approximately 1050 students. The members conducted interactive sessions on various topics such as Motor Vehicles Act, NDPS Act, Consumer Protection etc and also presented videos and PPTs to engage the students better.

#### **5. CJC TEACHING PROGRAMME**

The Christ Junior College (CJC) teaching program was organised by the Legal Aid and Awareness Committee, for the 2<sup>nd</sup> PUC students on the 24<sup>th</sup> of August, 2022. It was held at Christ Junior College, Main Campus, Hosur road, Christ (Deemed to be University). The purpose of this program was to impart a legal understanding and reasoning of few of the basic but significant subjects which we as normal citizens are exposed to on a regular basis. Legal sensitisation and legal awareness were the two guiding objectives of this program. 32 student volunteers from School of Law, consisting of the third and the fourth years along with the Committee members undertook this initiative. The program was guided by the Committee convenors and supervised by the faculty co-ordinator Mrs. Jayanthi Bai H.L.



#### About the Program

The student volunteers and Committee members were divided into teams of two, allotted to each class for engaging with the students respectively. The goal was to ensure that a legal spirit is instilled in the young students by having an interactive session, and giving them a solid understanding of the major legal principles, regulations, mandatory compliances, sanctions on non-compliance put forth by the legal topics in question.

The topics presented for the day were as follows:

- The Constitution of India, 1950
- The Motor Vehicles Act, 1988
- The Consumer Protection Act, 1986
- The Right to Information Act, 2005
- The Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act, 1985





#### Outcome of the Program

In order to make the session more interactive and captivating, a number of mindful presentations comprising of compelling content was displayed to the students to invoke their interests. The students were much aware of the fundamental rights engrained in our

Constitution, and also seemed to have a basic understating of the Motor Vehicles Act, the penalties and sanctions which it imposed on violation of rules. There were a number of queries put forth by the engrossed students while presenting the NDPS Act, the Consumer Protection Act and the RTI Act. The students divergently had their own unique take on certain laws which was then clarified by the presenters, and much to our surprise the students were consistently projecting their own socio-legal questions based on their personal experiences and sought answers to their share of problems. In the final minutes of the teaching session, the platform was open for the students and faculty of CJC to provide their opinions and feedback, thereby marking the end of teaching program.

The whole program in itself was an enriching experience for us law students, coupled with the active involvement of the 2<sup>nd</sup> PUC students, who themselves were much interested and intrigued in learning about the ways and working of the law. It was fruitful for both ends. The student volunteers agreed in uniformity of the learning experience which this program laid before them in sharpening their own legal knowledge while on the quest of answering the intricate questions posed by the interacting students. We were accompanied with our committee convenors and concerned faculty in charge, who ensured that this program was an overall success and bore the best outcome in aiding the students.

#### 6. STREET PLAY

The Legal Aid and Awareness Committee, School of Law, Christ (Deemed to be University) presented street plays titled "Koutumbika Dourjanya" (Domestic Violence), which highlighted the various forms of violence that women face in private spaces of their homes by their family members and "Sikshana Namma Hakku" (Education is Our Right) which stressed on the importance of education and awareness about the Right to Education Act, 2009. The street play was conducted in the Slums of Ragigudda, JP Nagar, Bangalore on 27<sup>th</sup> September 2022. The street play team was composed of law students from different years of study and the same was performed in Kannada.



#### A. Shikshana Namma Hakku - Education is our right

This street play aimed at promoting the benefits provided under the Right to Education Act, 2009. The play revolves around Mara, an illiterate man who understood the importance of education unlike his fellow villagers and gave his son the necessary education and support. Despite opposition from villagers to send his son to school, Mara refused to let his tender-aged son go to work. The play portrays parallelly the story of Mara's friend Beera, who has a myopic outlook on life and forces his son to work instead of providing him with an education. Fate turns and Mara's son becomes a highly qualified engineer and as a part of his work comes back to his village, while on the other hand, Beera and his son are still working as Masons for an

hourly wage and were assigned to work under Mara's son for his project. On seeing Mara's son's achievements, Beera and his son are astonished and realise the power of education.

#### B. Koutumbika Dourjanya- Domestic Violence

This play presents snippets of Gowri's life, who has been subjected to Domestic Violence all her life. The play kicks off with Gowri's husband Surappa, harassing her as usual, which was witnessed by their son and neighbours. The atrocity by Gowri's husband is condemned by the neighbours. Gowri's son considered this atrocity normal and acceptable until the Legal Aid Cell came to his school to create awareness about the issue of Domestic violence. With the help of the Legal Aid Cell, he registered a case with the nearby police station and got his father arrested for his crimes.



#### 7. LOK ADALAT VISIT

The legal aid and awareness committee conducted a series of visits to the Lok Adalat facilities at the various courts in the Bangalore metropolitan city for the students of the Final Year at the School of Law. The visit aimed at garnering experience for the students in the field of litigation and to familiarize them to the atmosphere of the courts before they were ready to set their foot into the field of law as a practice. The committee organized this visit with cooperation from the faculty coordinators who were extremely helpful in contacting the respective authorities necessary for the permissions for the students to visit the below mentioned courts and thus help in a smooth functioning of the visit.

The Courts visited by the students along with the faculty who helped the students in this visit to the Lok Adalats are as follows:

The visit to these courts of law for the students were assisted by 2 volunteers each for each of the classes who were members of the committee and these volunteers worked to provide assistance with maintaining the decorum of the students in these courts, and assisting the teachers with attendance, assisting the students with any further needs necessary. Further, the Volunteers also got an intrinsic insight into the functioning of the various courts of Lok adalat in the courts and also got an opportunity to interact with the judges. Furthermore, The judges took it upon themselves by voluntarily helping the students to understand the function within the courts and also advised them in having the necessary attitude in pursuing their legal practice in the sector.

The visit organized by the committee for the students was intended to start by 11:30 AM because most of the courts could only effectively start their functioning at around this time. The students were present at the common meeting grounds by 10 and then had to wait for the court halls to open. During this time, the attendance of the students was taken by the court and the students were kept in discipline with reverence to the honour of the court. Later, after finishing the second round of attendance, the students were dispersed from the court premises by 1:30.














# 4<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL LEGAL SERVICES FORUM, GUJRAT NATIONAL LAW UNIVERSITY

The Legal Aid and Awareness Committee represented School of Law, Christ (Deemed to be University) at the 4th Annual Legal Services Forum organized by the Gujarat National Law University on 13th & 14th of April, 2023 at Ahmedabad, Gujarat. The Forum sought to address multipronged actors affecting the access to legal aid for the marginalized communities of Indian society through a comprehensive discussion of the activities undertaken by various law schools and their legal aid committees, their best practices, round-table discussions amongst the best minds in the nation and lectures by esteemed dignitaries focusing on the revolutionizing of legal aid access. The committee's contribution in the field legal aid and awareness garnered it the position of Runners-up for presenting a detailed report on various activities conducted by the committee. The committee was represented by Dr. Mallaiah MR and student members-

Hon'ble Justice Karia felicitated the faculty convenors of the Legal Service Committees of all the participating universities. Thereafter, the much-awaited results were announced, with School of Law, Christ (Deemed to be University), Bangalore securing the runner up position and receiving a grant of Rs. 15,000. National Law University, Jodhpur bagged the first place, receiving a grant of Rs. 25,000.

#### **BENEFICIARIES**

The projects and events taken up by the committee primarily aim at the rural population of the country. With limited facilities, both socially and legally, their outreach to general aid and redressal is considerably the least. The Jan Sunwaii, legal aid camps, and adalat proceedings were especially focused on the rural areas, the villagers being given a platform to voice out their concerns and also settle disputes. The street plays and teaching program were focused on the economically backward urban population who, even though they might have the facilities, don't necessarily have the affordability and awareness. Teaching programs were also conducted in pre-university colleges, where the students were very keen in learning the various aspects of law and also know more about the general laws. The interactive sessions and presentations attracted the interest of several students who also showed interest in pursuing law as an option for higher education.

#### **IMPACT ASSESSMENT**

The data collected through surveys, both during camps and other speed mentoring sessions conducted in Government schools, was submitted to the District Legal Services Authority and the gram panchayat for further action. The survey, which included questions relating to the availability of various government and identity cards such as aadhar card, labour card, birth certificate and so on, a compiled list of the same was given to the concerned authorities who addressed the same by providing facility for submitting applications and availing such documents. The committee also filed applications, requisition letters and complaints to the PDO, Block Education Officer, Public Information Officer and other such authorities in relation to social problems in the villages.

- A complaint letter was filed to the Panchayat Development Officer regarding drains and garbage dumping.
- A requisition letter was filed to the Block Education Officer (BEO) regarding lack of infrastructural facilities at the government school.
- An RTI application was filed regarding the size of lakes in Tharoor village,
   Tumkur District.
- An RTI was filed regarding allotment of funds to Anganwadis and government school in Tharoor village, Tumkur District.

#### PROBLEMS AND CHALLENGES FACED

The general problem that was observed by the committee was the hesitation of villagers opening up to the members and other students. Since there is an evident lack of awareness amongst the rural population, it was a challenge to convey the object of the survey and other programs conducted by the committee. Many villagers were not open to the idea of others knowing their personal details and there was a sense of fear of misuse and legal action based on their information.

Many parties did not want to settle their disputes through the mediators due to lack of awareness and trust in alternate dispute resolution. The only means of resolution that most rural populations know and believe is through the mechanism of judicial proceedings even though the same is cumbersome and time-consuming. The bindingness of the award passed through mediation was also a concern of the villagers.

SUGGESTIONS AND INNOVATIVE PRACTICES

The committee, with a goal to achieve better implementation of legal aid and access to justice

seeks to adapt certain measures in order to fulfil the same. One method in which the scope of

legal aid could be expanded is through more involvement in the implementation process.

Ensuring that we take one more step towards the process of securing justice to those deserved,

it will not only quicken the process but also will provide a more practical experience to law

students and freshers in the legal fraternity.

Use of virtual and hybrid modes of communications will provide greater accessibility and

bridge the gap of traditional methods. Helpline numbers could be used in order to facilitate easy

and affordable communication. Manuals and handbooks on legal literacy in regional languages

will also be an effective manner in spreading awareness regarding basic rights, duties,

government schemes and more.



# 1. OVERVIEW OF CENTRE FOR SOCIAL ACTION

# 2. CSA DURING 2022-23



#### 2.1. STUDENT VOLUNTARY BODY

CSA's Student Voluntary Body is driven by six cohorts. Each of them is led by two cohort representatives and guided by a mentor. Every cohort is further divided into five programmes and multiple teams, to ensure its smooth functioning. The volunteers, who are part of the cohorts' plan, undertake the activities, in alignment with the focus areas of the government and the institution.

# **Cohort 1 - Child Sponsorship Programme (Educate. Empower. Elevate.)**

The Educate a Child Sponsorship Programme is a flagship initiative of CHRIST (Deemed to be University), which aims to inculcate the values of social responsibility. Christites are encouraged to sponsor the education of underprivileged children in the project areas. Annually, the Centre supports the education of 800+ students through the efforts of the management, faculty and students. The Child Sponsorship Programme cohort aims to transform the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 4 of Quality Education into a reality.



# Cohort 2 - Education and Skill Development (Learn. Ignite. Discover.)

The Education and Skill Development cohort under CSA aims to incentivise education for all through the volunteers' body and resources. It aligns with the values of Right to Education and NILP (New India Literacy Program) government policy and focuses on education and development of children in the adopted project areas of the Centre and also on skill development for dropouts. It involves several training and workshop programmes to incentivise soft and hard skills, equipping the learner to bag jobs and choose a suitable career efficiently. It engages volunteers with daily teaching sessions and events, with a focus on education and skill development sensitivity. This cohort aims to fulfil the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 4 of Quality Education into a practice.

# Cohort 3 - Environment and Sustainability (Revive. Resurge. Restore.)

The primary objective of the Environment and Sustainability Cohort is to foster awareness and understanding of environmental issues and sustainability, while aligning with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 7, 13 and 15. It aims to promote and instil practices of environmental sustainability by implementing a range of initiatives that are designed to engage individuals and communities in taking proactive steps towards creating a sustainable future. By raising awareness and educating on environmental challenges, the cohort empowers participants to make informed decisions and take meaningful action.

# Cohort 4 - Health, Hygiene, and Well-Being (Care. Nurture. Support.)

This cohort aims for development and accessibility of healthcare across communities, to sensitise communities on health education and promote clean habits. Its activities are

aligned to the Ayushman Bharat Initiative of the Government of India and the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals -1 No poverty, 2 Zero Hunger, 3 Good health & Well-being and 11 Sustainable Cities & Community. It will majorly strive to improve overall health, well-being and contribute to a sustainable lifestyle, imparting knowledge for the well-being of society.

# Cohort 5 - Media and Advocacy (Create. Express. Reform.)

The Media and Advocacy cohort of CSA will be taking care of the overall media, documentation and communication needs of the organisation. The cohort will also take up activities and initiatives relating to sensitisation through various digital, theatrical and non-theatrical modes.

# **Cohort 6 - Social Entrepreneurship (Initiate. Innovate. Inculcate)**

The Social Entrepreneurship cohort seeks to promote sustainable and inclusive economic growth by fostering business skills and innovation through a multi-dimensional approach, equipping students and alumni with the abilities and resources to manage social enterprises. It will also provide support to such entrepreneurs to expand their businesses and take marketing opportunities, working closely with them to develop a greater number of Self-Help Groups and empower locals. The programme is aligned with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) related to promoting decent work and economic growth (SDG 8), fostering innovation and partnerships for sustainable development (SDG 17).

**University Student Council Representatives** will enhance the overall graduate experience at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) by promoting the general welfare of the student body. They will create new programmes and initiatives to provide opportunities for growth and interaction and communicate with the administration and faculty on behalf of students. The representatives also conduct inter-campus collaboration and coordinate the functioning and activities of the Centre across the six campuses of India, facilitating smooth communication and coordination among the campuses.

# Campus Ambassador

The Campus Ambassador will ensure smooth communication between and within campuses. From organising rural exposure camps to general meetings, the Campus Ambassador supports all the stakeholders in the organisation. Given the vast potential of the CSA, it is the responsibility of the Campus Ambassador to communicate and implement new initiatives, acting as a bridge between the faculty and volunteers. They are also responsible for inter-campus collaboration and contacting other Campus Ambassadors

#### 2.2. CHILD SPONSORSHIP PROGRAMME

The Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) was the first initiative of CSA, a flagship programme of CSA since 1999. CSP is an initiative taken up by the students of CHRIST (Deemed to be University), in order to enable underprivileged children to grow in a community that ensures **quality education**,

health services, adequate nutrition, and opportunities for future employment and income, aimed at their holistic development.

Started way back in 1999 by supporting 52 children, today CSA is able to cater to the educational needs of the marginalized children.

Christites, students and staff are rendering monetary and student-mentoring services for vulnerable children from marginalized communities of urban slums and rural villages. The sponsored children are provided with required educational materials like notebooks, stationeries, bags, shoes, school fees, and hygienic nutrition kits. During 2022-23, through the Christites contribution, this program has enabled over 800 children to move closer to their educational goals.

Financial mobilization for CSP is also facilitated through Parivarthana, a unit that works on recycling the wastes from the university into materials such as notebooks, frames, exam pads, pen holders, bags, and bottles among other things.

Children up to 14 years of age are sponsored to ensure that the children complete their education until 8th grade and the children up to 16 years of age are supported to ensure that they complete their education till 10th grade. Under this programme, the developmental needs of a child can be covered with a contribution of Rs. 4500 for a year.

Children Activity Centre is an intricate system of CSP providing value education to underprivileged children. It works to improve the academic /non-academic performance of the adopted children through informal academic sessions, extracurricular activities, personality development camps, picnic cum study exposure, and sports events. Student Volunteers conduct activity-based sessions and tutoring classes for the sponsored children so as to improve their critical life skills, soft skills, and personality development.

#### Impact:

- CSAs this initiative covers SDG 4 Quality Education, SDG 3 Good Health and Well-being, and SDG 11 Sustainable Cities and Communities.
- The children who benefit from the CSP are likely to get closer to their educational aspirations owing to the collective efforts of the CSA.
- The student community is provided with an opportunity to acknowledge and play their role
  in the betterment of society through the fulfilment of CSP objectives.
- The students are provided with the opportunity to articulate the causes that the CSA stands for to the general public thereby enabling them to be the torchbearers of change in the community.
- By working closely with the recycled products, the student community gain an understanding on a personal level about the impact of individual and collective environment-conscious action thereby embracing the CSA motto "WE CARE".

#### 2.3. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

#### 2.3.1. Urban Projects

# 2.3.1.1. Project 3D (Desirable Dynamic Development and Empowerment Project)

Janaki ram layout is a slum in Bangalore. The slum is relatively unhygienic. The slum is spread across 6 kilometres with around 3500 households.85% of the people generally are below poverty line. The majority of the people are working as daily wage earners. Some are working as rag pickers and few women are working in garment factories. Drinking water problem is acute leading to physical

ailment. There are only 2 Govt Schools and 3 private schools in this area, which is inadequate to cover all the school aged children in the slum. On an average there are 3 to 6 children in each family, so the family size is large in general. The Programme strives towards mainstreaming children into formal educational setups (Schools). Thereby children are provided with financial and educational support through direct and in-direct support. The direct support includes Tuition classes, Note Books, School bags, shoes, stationary materials and other educational aids. Under the child sponsorship Programme (CSP). Women are organized into Self Help Groups (SHG's) for promoting socio-economic stability through management of finance, savings and by addressing family and societal issues through weekly meetings. There are 11 SHGs with 180 members doing well in terms of savings, lending money to its members (micro finance) and addressing various family and domestic issues through sharing ideas and mutual support.





# 2.3.1.2. Project Vriddhi

# **Background:**

The Vriddhi project focuses mainly on two Slum areas in Bangalore; LR Nagar and Rajendra Nagar in Koramangala and Madiwala in Siddhartha colony. The Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) focuses on holistic child development by supporting tuition class, basic computer skills and encouraging reading books through the library centre. It is an inspiring initiative by CSA with the contribution of the student community of CHRIST (Deemed to be University). CSP supports around 275 children from the slum with regard to their education and enables them in continuing it hence reducing the school dropout rate. There are two Activity centres, a computer centre and a children's library are being managed in helping the children with their academics. The children are provided with stationery items, bags, and books. Regular medical check-ups and strict monitoring of their diets are taken care of through nutritious kits that are provided to the children. Value education classes are provided to children on a monthly basis. Medical camps, community engagement events etc. are conducted along with regular SHG meetings as well. There are 16 fully functioning SHGs for women and they were linked with various free subsidy bank loans this year as well. A fixed amount is allocated as a revolving fund from the government in collaboration with BBMP. Each group has around a savings of ₹3.00 lakhs.

#### **Major Achievement:**

The performance of the SHGs over the years has been progressing. All the groups have been regularly meeting and continuing their savings, and credit activities. They meet every month to discuss and finalize the inter loaning for promoting income generation and livelihood activities. During 2022-23 CSA have given new opportunities like celebrating women's day in both sites. The nutritious kits were given more in number as compared to the year before. More community members availed the services like the health check-ups that were conducted by the Vriddhi Project. The SHG women were given skill building sessions with regard to the making of paper bags which will enhance their skills.

275 children are taken care of under the CSP wing of Vriddhi project. 200 of them are distributed among the 2 activity centres in L.R. Nagar and the rest 75 are from Madiwala. The older children avail the computer centre services provided in L.R Nagar on a weekly basis. Stationery and nutrition kits are provided to these children this year as well. Health check-ups were conducted with the children as the main focus. They were provided with multi vitamins and calcium tablets to enhance their growth and development. Midday meals are also provided to the children in two government adopted schools as part of the Vriddhi Project.

Some of the events conducted this year were Teacher's Day program, Children's Day program, International Literacy Day, Women's Day, etc. Awareness sessions on financial management, substance abuse, child rights etc., were also conducted. Nasha Mukt Bharat Abhiyan (NMBA) conducted awareness sessions on substance abuse and how to deal with family members abusing substances. The student volunteers have conducted gully cricket matches which involved active participation from the youth from the community.

#### **Benefit to Volunteers:**

Interacting with children the student volunteers are more confident to conduct sessions more effectively. Consciousness of the student volunteers about child rights has been on the rise as they are practicing and ensuring child rights. It is an opportunity for them to make good contact and connect with children and be aware of the problem that the slum children experience. The students understood the point of views that were voiced by the women too. Through organizing and planning the events associated with children and women, their critical thinking and fast action to take the responsibility and help the less privileged community has instilled a sense of social responsibility. Students also developed the ideas to do the community-based programs and experimented the same. It was an eye opener to the volunteers about the life of the children from lower economic sections of the society. Volunteers did get an opportunity to network with many other organizations and professionals.

# **Benefit to Community:**

Children and their families were glad for the support we haven given to them, especially about the medical check-up they came to know the health condition of the children, children with under-nourishment, vision problems and other learning disabilities. Appropriate referrals to hospitals were also made for the needy. The health status of 70 children were assessed and medicines were provided to them as well. The importance of checking their health regularly was also understood by the community. Helping children and families for progressing in education, working for improved health conditions, providing economical support to the parents of the CSP children motivates them and drives towards independence.

#### **Future Plan:**

The events that were conducted this year were successful and exhibited full cooperation and participation from the community members. It is to be hoped that the next year will also bring forth the opportunities to conduct these events and many more.

More skill building sessions can be conducted in order for increased self-employment opportunities for the SHG women. More meetings other than the monthly ones can be conducted that will provide these women a space to interact and communicate with each other informally. Cultural programs can also be conducted during these times.

The children can be taken out for more one day programs which will provide them with an exposure to atmospheres other than their own community. They can be provided with educational sessions, cultural and physical activities like sports competitions which will nurture their group learning and interaction process.

# 2.3.2.1. Bastar Community Development Project

**Background:** Since 1999, CSA has been implementing development projects across Chhattisgarh. CSA started to partner with KNH in 2002 and implemented various developmental projects for the community with sustainability as its main focus. Initially CSA implemented CFCD projects and now is implementing SHA projects in Chhattisgarh. In all the localities the marginalized women are doing well, and the development is visible with women, their family and in the community. Livelihood is given much priority in the sustained projects. Education to children is given more importance as the parents understand the importance of education and they send their children to school regularly. Sanitation level is improved, 80% of the beneficiaries across the project area have constructed toilets and are using it.

# **Major Achievement:**

# A) ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT:

- 60 self-help groups have mobilized ₹5,21,4371 through SHG fund and using the fund for livelihood activities. Sometimes they use it for emergency health care or children's education.
- SHG mobilized ₹1.65 lakhs through NRLM fund for the SHG strengthening and ₹6.60 lakhs to start income generation activities.
- 3 SHGs received a sum of ₹4.00 lakhs as loan from a local bank to start income generation activities.
- Through the Bastar project two CLAs were supported with ₹2.00 lakhs each for livelihood promotion.
- 35 young girls are trained in tailoring through skill development initiatives, of which, 5 girls have established their own tailoring centre.
- SHGs have started group business through the financial and technical support; 3 SHG are making Detergent powder, Phenyl, Toilet cleaner, 2 SHGs are making candles, 1 SHG is making Agarbathi (Incense sticks), 2 SHGs have started Fishery and 2 SHG are selling forest products. 383 families have started individual businesses.
- The SHG members took loans from SHG, CLA and started the businesses like Fishery, Piggery, goat rearing, Poultry, aromatic rice cultivation, petty shop, vegetable vendor and small hotels.

#### B) SOCIAL EMPOWERMENT

- SHG women are empowered to take the leadership; they were able to organize International Women's Day with 650 women. SHG members took complete responsibility for the program and made it successful.
- 18 school dropout children were re-enrolled in schools, 12 youth got readmission in distance education courses and 7 SHG women who discontinued their studies long back again get admission privately to continue their academic career.
- 78 women underwent the Blood Pressure and Haemoglobin check up by collaboration with Govt. Primary Health Centre.
- Project staff promoted COVID booster dose vaccination in all 34 villages.
- Members of 8 SHG had conducted village cleaning drives in 5 villages; they cleaned the drain, school and Anganwadi campus.
- Project staff supported the health department staff in spreading awareness on Malaria and Typhoid in 14 villages.
- SHG members raised their voices against domestic violence and brought peace in 7 families as the alcoholic husbands exploited their wives.

# C) POLITICAL EMPOWERMENT

- One member of Muskan SHG won the bi-election of Bethiya panchayat and became the sarpanch.
- Two SHG women are elected as district panchayat member.
- This year SHG members and their family received following government schemes by the project's intervention:
  - i. 33 families dug small ponds through NREGS for fishery.
  - ii. 60 Acres of land of 15 families was levelled with the support of the panchayat.
  - iii. 142 families were linked with e-shram cards so that they will get benefits.
  - iv. 30 families are getting direct benefit through Kishan Nidhi Yojana from 2022-23.
  - v. 46 new members are added in the ration card.
  - vi. 52 families received job cards, 185 families linked with Ayushmaan health scheme.
  - vii. 55 families constructed houses through PM Awas Yojana.
  - viii. 32 families received a solar (water) pump set for agriculture.
  - ix. Pakka roads were constructed in 2 villages and Concrete roads constructed in 3 villages.
  - x. Safe Drinking facilities through high raised water tanks were set up in 3 villages.

# **Impact Created by the Bastar Project**

During this reporting period the project has impacted the lives of children, women, adolescents, and communities in the area of social, political, economic and ecological environmental especially in the context of child rights.

Impact contributes for Social Empowerment:

- The Lives of around 1700 families in 34 villages are improving.
- 60 SHGs are effectively bringing women together to plan, implement and monitor social development programmes.
- More than 600 families benefited from government assistance for setting up fisheries ponds (19), e-labour cards (133), Sukanya Yojana (361), solar pump set (23) and Pradhan Mantri Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana (24), besides Ration cards, Job card, Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana, Pradhan Mantri Life insurance, Gas cylinder connection and Ayushman cards.
- People's participation is on the increase through the involvement of SHGs in cleaning of village roads, networking with panchayat for construction of 3.5kms long village roads, constructed from village Sitagaon to Jalbahi, in Dotometa 150 meters' concrete road was laid by panchayat
- Social commitment of the villagers is increasing. Few examples are: i) Boundary fencing construction for Anganwadi premises in Bhurbushi village, ii) closing down the liquor shop advocating with the government, iii) advocating for replacing the damaged transformer Pushkar village, etc.
- Organic farming practices among small farmers.

# Impact contributes for Political Empowerment:

- Capacity of people's institutions, leaders of PRI, village elders are built through training and meetings and networking with the panchayats and government departments.
- The villagers, especially women, are visiting and sharing their issues with government stakeholders like Panchayats, WC&D, Health & Education departments, Janpad panchayats, Zilla Panchayats, etc.
- They have networked with Panchayats and other government stakeholders and availed job cards to get the daily wage employment.
- Women are getting elected as sarpanch and village panchayat presidents.

Impact contributes for Economic Empowerment:

- 60 SHGs are linked with Chhattisgarh Rajya Gramin Bank (CRGB), State Bank of India (SBI) and NRLM banks. Mobilization of ₹32.00 lakhs from NRLM, nationalized banks, Chhattisgarh Gramin Bank for income generation activities for supporting 142 individual businesses and 5 group businesses.
- Increase in the household income of these families and they are able to provide basic needs to their children, including food, shelter, cloth, good health and education.
- Career guidance training has impacted a lot in the lives of their children, adolescents and women.
- Families availed ration cards and received houses through PMAY.
- Families practice kitchen gardens contributing towards no malnourishment among children, pregnant women and adolescent girls.

#### 2.3.2.2. Chethana Project

# **Background:**

Chethana Child Focused Community Development Project (CFCD) continues to extend its support to the community in 11 of its target villages. The main activity which is happening at the moment in the project is building the capacity of the SHG women and taking efforts to sustain the project. Federation is formed and registered under Karnataka Societies Act 1960. Federation members are involving themselves in all the project related activities and helping the project team in implementing it effectively. At present 53 Self Help Groups (SHGs) are functioning in all target villages. 3 CLAs are formed to continue to support SHGs for their effective functioning. Project team along with Federation members and SHG women are monitoring and maintaining all the activities like running supplementary education centres, monitoring Anganwadi, coordinating with health and ICDS departments, etc. Women are empowered socially and economically. Once the women become a member of SHG their financial needs are met through the group support and it helps them to improve their living conditions and thus the families are able to provide good education to their children. Awareness programmes are being conducted in the villages in association with health, education departments and students from CHRIST (Deemed to be University).

#### Early Childhood Care (ECC):

In collaboration with ICDS, the community created the model ECC centre in target villages and extending technical support to run it effectively. ECC has helped in reducing the malnutrition among 0-6 years' age children and to creating awareness among the ANC/PNC mothers on child care, nutrition and timely immunization. There are 23 ECCs in 21 villages with 156 children. This number of boys and girls has been changing every year due to demographic and socio-economic changes. These Anganwadi are more child-friendly teaching involving songs and plays in some of the centres. The educational interventions of the Chethana project, through the government Anganwadi, have helped to create increased awareness and motivation among the parents about the education of their children.

# Strengthening Children's Education:

School going children are supported to grow in a community that ensures quality education through life skill development programs. Village level Supplementary Education Centres caters 297 children

in nine villages. Children are helped to prepare for their exams and homework and also get an opportunity to improve on their life skills.

Village level Children Parliament are functioning in 11 villages and the meeting of ministers have been taking place discussing about school academic examinations, feedback of celebration of Children's Day, national festivals, etc. Children parliament ministers are guided to take up responsibilities from their young age, and they use their free time productively by way of discussing matters which develop themselves as well as the community where they live in. 35 students were taken to CHRIST (Deemed to be University) to participate in the 'Milan' event organised by CSA during Feb. 2023.

# Community Health and Hygiene:

The community were sensitized on their personnel health and hygiene, good environment and global warming. Network meeting with Primary Health Centre (PHC) conducted along with ASHA volunteers. One health check-up camp was conducted in the project area involving PHC team and R.L. Jalappa Medical College & Hospital team. Seethanayakanahalli and Enjanahalli village was provided with a water filter each for ensuring safe water to the children in particular.

# Community Based Organizations:

It is believed that the sustainable village development is possible through building community institutions like SHGs, CLAs, Federation, youth groups. Fifty-three SHGs, 5 CLAs, one Federation and one Credit Cooperative Bank managed by women is vibrantly continuing their journey. During 2022-23 the project had witnessed one capacity building training at project level participated by 63 CLA members. They were trained in sustainability, resource mobilization, government schemes, ownership, rapport with stakeholders, network and linkages and etc. CLAs also taking responsibility in the continued effective functioning of the project. Organized capacity building training for Federation members they are also aware on sustainability of the project, network and linkages with government and other departments. The credit cooperative society begun with shareholding amount of ₹30 lakhs about five years have now grown with a net worth capital of ₹3.00 crores and with the membership of 900 women.

# Livelihood Promotions:

Women are supported to explore livelihood opportunities for generating additional income, secure their families and build community". They access loan from the credit cooperative society and engage in various livelihood activities.

Chethana project had been the learning platform for students and faculties, both from domestic and international universities. A total of 580 students from different department of CHRIST (Deemed to be University) and around 70 students and faculties from international universities (from Western Michigan, VIVES, HAN, Katho, Nord, etc.) have learnt the village life, people, source of income, livelihood activities, role of community institutions in empowerment process and sustainability.

# 2.3.2.3. Pragathi Child Focused Community Development Project Kolar

Pragathi Child Focused Community Development Project Kolar continues to extend its support to the community in 22 of its target villages. The main activity which is happening at the moment in the project is building the capacity of the SHG women and taking efforts to sustain the project. Federation is formed and registered under Karnataka Societies Act 1960. Federation members are involving themselves in all the project related activities and helping the project team in implementing it effectively. At present 42 Self Help Groups (SHGs) are functioning in all target villages. 3 Cluster Level Associations are formed to maintain and support SHGs for their effective functioning. Project team along with Federation members and SHG women are monitoring and maintaining all the activities like running supplementary education centre, monitoring Anganwadi, coordinating with health and ICDS departments. Women are empowered socially and economically. Once the women become a member of SHG their financial needs are met and it helps them to improve their living condition and is able to give good education to their children. Awareness programmes are being conducted in the villages in association with health, education departments and students from CHRIST (Deemed to be University).

# Early Childhood Care:

The erstwhile Early Childhood Care centres established by the project is now maintained as Anganwadi centres by the government through ICDS in 22 villages with the continued support and guidance from the community. 221 children between the age of 2 to 6 are attending in these 22 centres. The centres focus on engaging the children with action songs, individual and group games, and ensure more child friendly environment and care. They are also provided with nutritious noon meal contributing to strengthen their health. Pregnant and lactating mothers are also provided with supplementary food, besides sensitizing them on child care, nutrition, timely immunization, etc. Over the years there are no children reported as anaemic.

#### Strengthening Children's Education:

School going children in target villages are supported for having a positive learning environment, where in quality education is assured for preventing school dropout, enhancing academic performance and promoting higher education. Besides focusing on the academic requirement, the children are also guided to develop appropriate life skills. Volunteers, who are the siblings of 256 school going children from the villages are supported through 22 supplementary education centres. Few of the children those who are not attending the project run supplementary education centres are said to be accessing private tuitions by paying a fee.

Children Parliament is functioning in 21 villages with the 105 ministers. Ensuring child rights and child protection, preventing child labour and undertaking rallies to create awareness on health, hygiene and environment are the areas that are discussed and formulate appropriate actions in children parliament. They also discuss about children's academic examinations, feedback on the Children's Day observation, National festivals. Children parliament ministers are guided in a right direction, they are learning to take up responsibilities from their young age, and they use their free time productively by way of discussing matters which develop themselves as well as the community where they live in.

This year around 35 children from the target villages had an opportunity to take part in the Milan 2023, the biennial event conducted at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) by CSA. This was a three-day event participated by 250 marginalised children from CSA's project villages and city slums dwellings. Children were engaged with different games, stalls focussing on educating and stimulating the children, colouring activities, sports and cultural shows marked the first two days of the event. Best performing children were provided with prizes and awards. It was an enriching experience of learning from other children belong to different region and student volunteers of CHRIST. The programme also set a stage to demonstrate their skills in various sports, art, culture, and also promoted leadership among the children.

# Community Health and Hygiene:

The project continues to network with PHCs in villages and ASHA volunteers to sensitize the community on personnel health and hygiene. This year there are four medical camps were organized in collaboration with R.L. Jalappa Medical College & Hospital, local PHC team and ASHA volunteers.

# Community Based Organizations:

Over the years Pragathi project had mobilized people under various Community Based Organizations including Self Help Group, Village Development Committees, Youth groups, Children Parliament, Child Protection Committees, etc. SHGs are formed by women to work towards making the women independent, financially capable and take up leadership roles in the community leading to women empowerment and sustainability. As of now there are 42 SHGs functioning effectively with the membership of 520 women. These groups are federated in to 3 Cluster Level Associations (CLA) and further formed in to Federation. Federation (Pragathi Mahila Samsthe) was registered and is planning to establish Credit Cooperative Society. As a registered body, the Federation got a free land from the Government to construct the Federation Office.

Meetings of SHGs takes place every week to decide on the group functioning, livelihood promotion, capacity building programmes, etc., while there are monthly review and planning meetings of CLA and quarter meetings of Federation takes place. As part of the sustainability of the project, SHGs/CLAs/Federation are sanitised on resource mobilization, accessing government schemes, facilitating ownership, stakeholders' participation, network and linkages etc. CLA and Federation are also taking responsibility of facilitating children's day, women's day observations and other days of national and international importance.

#### Livelihood Promotions:

The SHGs are the primary unit that facilitate promotion of livelihood through micro lending from their savings in the target villages. As of now there are no individual member who had not taken loan for venturing in to income generating activities bringing additional income to the family. Loans are

usually obtained for investing in to farming activities, animal husbandry, setting up micro enterprises, and meeting the expenditure relating to educating the children, addressing health and medical needs, meeting emergencies, maintaining the household and houses. The loaning sources is just not limited to SHGs' own savings alone, but there is also a revolving fund being provided by CLA to SHGs.

- 2. Mobilise an additional land space for Federation Office from the Government.

- 4. Organize health camps collaborating with government PHC.
- 5. Facilitate conducting annual statutory auditing of SHGs/CLAs
- 6. Preparation of Agriculture Business to Federation Member's.

# 2.3.2.4. Unnathi SHA-CFCD Project # Jamkandi

Since 1999, CSA has been implementing developmental projects across Karnataka, Telangana, Maharashtra Kerala and Chhattisgarh. CSA started to partner with KNH since 2002 and implementing various developmental projects for the community with sustainability as its main focus. Initially CSA implemented CFCD projects and now implementing SHA project in Karnataka and Chhattisgarh. All together there are six projects implemented in partnership with KNH. 4 CFCD project were phased out and sustained, they are managed by the registered federations in the respective areas. In all the localities the women are doing well, and the development is visible with women, their family and in the community. Livelihood is given much priority in the sustained projects. One of the sustained projects in Karnataka has started a co-operative bank in their impact village which helps the women to get good accessibility towards the banking and its services. Education to children is given more importance as the parents understand the importance of education and they send their children to school regularly. Sanitation level is improved, 80% of the beneficiaries across the project area have constructed toilets and using it.

# 2.4. PARIVARTHANA

Parivarthana is a zero waste management project organized to create an eco-friendly environment by implementing solid waste management practices advocating 3Rs – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. Born out of CSA's "Trash to Treasure" project Parivarthana unit came into being in May 2008 with a view to improving waste collection, recycling and livelihood promotion. Beginning to serve the slum community in Rajendra Nagar and Ambedkar Nagar, Parivarthana has been serving and the University for 15 long years commissioning focusing on i) Collection and Segregation of waste, ii) Recycling paper and producing handmade paper, iii) Producing Compost, iv) Producing Bio-gas, and v) Treating & recycling water. Since 2008, it has been creating both a social as well as an ecological impact through organized efforts to ensure proper waste management practices with the relenting help of the women working in the unit and the students in the campus.

# **Waste Collection and Segregation**

Bangalore Central Campus of the University during 2022-23 generated over 2.27 lakhs kg of wastes, which comprises of wet waste (70%), dry waste (27%) and reject waste (3%). Wet waste is further segregated for producing bio-gas and producing compost/manure. During 2022-23, 61,601kgs of dry waste generated by the campus was sold and brought a revenue of ₹4.22 lakhs. Parivarthana has been providing the learning platform for the student community and general public to get sensitized, trained and involved in different waste management processes including segregation of waste, manufacturing of handmade papers, producing compost, generating biogas and treating waste water and thus building the future community environmentally responsible.

#### **Compost Unit**

After segregating the wet waste like kitchen waste, fruit/vegetable waste and other bio-mass are converted in to organic manure through a treatment process of composting for a period of 45 days. The contents of the composting tank become a homogenous mixture generating revenue to Parivarthana. The input waste of 14,215kgs is processed and converted in to 4,524 kg compost/manure during 2022-23 generating a revenue of ₹1.3 lakh. The compost is sold to outside institutions and individuals besides feeding the lush garden being maintained inside the University campus throughout the year.

#### **Water Treatment Plant**

The water treatment plant at Parivarthana involves an elaborate process to ensure that the recycled water is safe for vegetation and gardening. On an average 1.5 lakhs litres of water is re-cycled on every working day. During 2022-23, 19,387kld of grey water is treated and used for vegetation and gardening in Bangalore central campus. Similarly, grey water is being treated, re-cycled and used for vegetation and gardening in Kengeri Campus as well.

#### Bio-gas

The wet waste generated in the University campus, food waste in particular amounting to 1,44,480kg is processed during 2022-23, which had generated bio-gas equivalent to 6,556kgs of LPG worth of ₹5,52,240 in terms of revenue. The slurry rich in nutrients generated is used for vegetation.

#### **Paper Recycling Unit**

Parivarthana make best use of waste scrap paper generated by the University and recycle it by producing handmade paper and manufacture paper products of varied kinds, thus contributing towards a 'zero waste campus'. These products are supplied to the students, various departments

of the University, besides other institutions like St. Joseph's University, Bangalore for seminars, workshops and conferences. This year Parivarthana had generated a revenue of ₹4.82 lakhs.

# Student volunteers of CSA undertake awareness campaigns on E-waste management and has ensured a systematic way of e-waste collection which is then sold in the scrap market to generate revenue for the Parivarthana.

#### Few Extra Mileage for Parivarthana

- Parivarthana works in collaboration with local government Bruhat Bengaluru Mahanagara Palike (BBMP) and many other civil society organizations, corporate bodies, academic institutions and slum communities.
- Reject waste is controlled and it is only 3% within the campus, whereas 10 to 15 % is permissible according to BBMP rule.
- The waste management practices of the University are recognized and has received awards from the Department of Horticulture, Karnataka, consecutively for the past 10 years, in recognition for its clean and green concept.

#### 2.5. INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS EXCHANGE (write up by Catherine)

CSA has tie-ups with 8 international universities, as part of bilateral cooperation on the community development program and student exchange through a Memorandum of Understanding. Students from partner universities abroad visit CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bangalore for outreach programmes and service-learning projects. These projects last for a minimum of 3 weeks to a maximum of 6 months. Some students have taken up a year-long course as part of their academic curriculum.

Student exchange is an opportunity where international students explore problems faced by underprivileged sections in India and understand the Indian perspective of social work. The students were placed in slum development projects of CSA in Janakiram Layout and LR Nagar, Bangalore and in Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) based on the student's motivation and interest. In the last academic year, we had 15 students coming from Nord, VID, NTNU and HAN Universities for social outreach programme as a part of their Social Work Practicum.

This outreach programme contributes to their professional, personal development, and career. Apart from this, the students also learn through cultural exchange, gain social and service knowledge to bring about sustainable and meaningful developmental change. It brings together people from international universities with diverse backgrounds and communities to organize service activities develop leadership and professional skills with able academic instructions.

### **BGR Campus**

Centre for Social Action in CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bannerghatta Road campus has begun its journey towards realizing the vision of the University 'Excellence and Service' during 2016. Following the footsteps of CSA, the parental unit, Bannerghatta Road campus too implement the student voluntary initiatives through five verticals. During 2022-23, around 150 student volunteers of the campus spearheaded all the activities. This annual report encapsulates the impact created in the past year, and reflecting on the same. The initiatives taken up during 2022-23 by Bannerghatta Road campus is benefitting 40 families and 100 children.

#### **Major Achievements:**

• Mukti Bike Challenge: This is a week-long event organized by the NGO Oasis-India from October 29 to November 4, 2022. The objective of the challenge was to raise awareness about human trafficking and its various forms. Drishti, collaborated with Oasis-India and performed street plays in 13 different locations across India, starting from Bangalore and ending in Miraj, Maharashtra. The event had a significant impact on the community as it sensitized people about the issue of human trafficking, including child labour and sexual abuse. Street plays were performed in government schools and colleges, raising awareness among students about the risks of kidnapping. The widespread performances allowed Drishti to reach a larger audience across the country. The volunteers involved in the event gained valuable experiences and learnings. They were exposed to challenging and unpredictable situations, enabling them to better understand and navigate crisis scenarios. The event also provided the volunteers with a deeper understanding of the severity of human trafficking and enhanced their theatre skills through street plays. The experience sparked a sense of concern and motivation among the volunteers to actively contribute to the cause. The Mukti Bike Challenge gathered media attention through news articles and videos, which further amplified its impact.

- MILAN 2023: CRISHT Bangalore Central Campus hosted a remarkable biennial event organized by the Centre for Social Action. Over three days, it brought together children from different project areas, providing them with an array of activities and learning experiences. The event commenced with an opening ceremony featuring introductions, highlighting the project areas and initiatives, setting the stage for a memorable occasion. The first day featured a march past, games, and a lively carnival with stalls, and entertainment for children and volunteers alike. On the second day, non-stage events stimulated the children's creativity, with colouring activities and a "best from waste" competition promoting recycling. The closing ceremony included a captivating flash mob and surprises, followed by prize distribution and an after-movie capturing the event's highlights. The community was united, and children from the Bagalkot project area enjoyed a Bangalore Darshan, exploring famous landmarks. Milan 2023 had a profound impact, fostering camaraderie, sportsmanship, and talent expression among the children. Student Volunteers gained valuable skills, witnessing the positive influence they had on the children's lives, fostering empathy and understanding.
- Ground to Glory: Ground to Glory was held at the Decathlon Bannerghatta Flagship store from 5th to 9th March 2023, with the objective of promoting and supporting underprivileged children. The highlight of the event was the football match, where participants showcased their skills and passion for the sport. The match not only brought together players from different backgrounds but also attracted enthusiastic spectators who cheered and supported the teams. It created a sense of unity among the participants and fostered a spirit of healthy competition. Through the event's success, 'Ground to Glory' managed to raise enough funds to support the education of 12 students from project areas. This tangible achievement showcases the effectiveness of the event in making a real and lasting impact on the lives of underprivileged children. Ground to Glory brought together sports, community engagement, and fundraising to make a positive difference in the lives of underprivileged children. It created awareness, fostered unity, and raised funds to support education, showcasing the power of collective efforts in bringing about meaningful change. The event served as an eye-opener among the community, particularly the participating students, about the importance of education and the need to support underprivileged children's education. It highlighted the role education plays in empowering individuals and uplifting communities.
- Clean Up Drive: This drive, in collaboration with Akzo Nobel and Youth for Seva, revitalized the surroundings of Mahatma Children's Home. With dedicated volunteers and assistance from BBMP workers. The area was cleared and the walls were scrubbed and painted. The drive had a positive impact on the community, making the area more accessible and discouraging future waste dumping. Volunteers gained valuable knowledge on waste segregation and developed a sense of rapport. The event showcased the power of collaboration and the importance of collective action for environmental sustainability. The Clean Up Drive left a lasting impression, fostering a sense of pride and responsibility among the community members and inspiring future initiatives. The Clean Up Drive resulted in a significant improvement in the cleanliness and hygiene of the surroundings, making the area more pleasant and inviting for the community and the residents of Mahatma Children's Home. It significantly enhanced the quality of life for community members and residents in the neighbourhood. A cleaner and more aesthetically pleasing environment created a positive and uplifting atmosphere, contributing to overall well-being. By removing accumulated waste and debris, 'the drive' also helped to eliminate potential health hazards and

improved safety in the community. Reduced litter and properly managed waste reduced the risk of diseases, pests and accidents.

- Irenic: Irenic, focused on promoting positive mental health and coping mechanisms among students. The event, held over three days, aimed to raise awareness about mental health and combat the stigma surrounding it. The event featured stalls sensitizing students to different mental disorders and illnesses. An interactive workshop was conducted in collaboration with MACS (Mentoring and Counselling Services) to provide students with practical coping strategies. An orientation session on self-compassion was conducted by Miss Ridhi Pugalia, a Mental Health expert, emphasizing the importance of mental well-being. Irenic served as a timely reminder for students to prioritize their mental health in a competitive and stressful world. By promoting awareness, providing practical tools, and encouraging open dialogue, the event contributed to the overall well-being of the community and empowered individuals to take charge of their mental wellness. Students were encouraged to identify and understand mental health conditions portrayed by various characters from movies and web series. This exercise fostered empathy and a deeper comprehension of the diverse challenges individuals face regarding their mental well-being. Irenic successfully raised awareness among students about the importance of mental health. Through the event, participants gained a better understanding of different mental disorders and illnesses, breaking the stigma surrounding these issues.
- CSP Carnival: The Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) Carnival, held on 21st January 2023, was a heart-warming event. The event began with enthusiastic preparations as CSA members discussed the interaction between students and children, along with decorations and arrangements. Children arrived in batches, radiating excitement. Highlights included interactions with first-year students from various departments, fostering curiosity and mutual learning. CSA star badges and lollipop accessories were awarded, and a grand entry was made through a rainbow carpet. Throughout the day, children engaged in fun activities and games, including Cupomatic and computer science exploration. A workshop on consent by MACS empowered children with knowledge of personal boundaries and the importance of saying "no". The Child Sponsorship Programme (CSP) Carnival created awareness among CHRIST (Deemed to be University) students about the positive impact their contributions can make in the lives of underprivileged children. The workshop on consent, conducted by MACS empowered the children with knowledge about their rights and limits, promoting a sense of empowerment and self-awareness. Through activities like Cupomatic and computer science exploration, the children had the opportunity to develop new skills and expand their knowledge in a fun and interactive manner.

#### **Benefit to Volunteers:**

- The volunteers gained a sense of purpose, satisfaction and fulfilment from contributing to a worthy cause. They were making a difference in the community.
- The volunteers developed a sense of unity and belonging through their engagement with the community and contributed significantly to society.
- Participating in events like a clean-up drive allows them to see tangible results and witness the positive impact of their efforts. It increases their understanding of the importance of waste reduction, recycling, and maintaining clean surroundings.

- The volunteers were exposed to more challenging and unpredictable circumstances, which improved their comprehension of and ability to deal with crisis situations.
- Events like Mukthi Bike Challenge enabled the volunteers to gain more awareness and insights about serious societal issues like human trafficking and child labour. It taught them to adjust to the surroundings and made them realise the importance of being grounded.
- The volunteers acquired professional abilities such as managing a team and cooperating with outside teams to accomplish a common objective. It taught the importance of teamwork, how a team supports and complements each other.
- The flagship event of MILAN 2023 helped volunteers to learn and know more about our project area children and understand the necessities of life and the value of luxury. This event also helped them in learning management and organisational skills.
- Volunteers gained an insight on how things work on an actual ground level and CSA as a
  whole impact the community. It made them realise how every small effort contributes to
  society.

#### **Benefit to Community:**

- Plantation drives enabled the locality to be transformed from contaminated dwellings to beautiful and safe environments with improved soil, air and water quality. Further motivating the local residents to keep the place maintained, green and clean. Preventing piling up of garbage and reduced pollution would prevent infectious diseases, boosting cleanliness and hygiene.
- Nutrition kit drive sensitized the families of the project area children about good nutrition and with the initiative of distributing rations to these families, they were able to provide for their household food with high nutrition enabling a practice of healthy eating and diet for the coming youth.
- Street plays and Mukthi Bike Challenge sensitized the people of various localities about pressing social issues. It empowered people to take action whenever such incidents took place. The advantage of partnering up with NGOs in the same cause allowed the actors to also inform the audience who they can approach in similar situations further spreading significant awareness. Making people more aware by telling stories of the pain a girl goes through in a society that has oppressed her further educated and sensitized about the disheartening side of the society and how there is an urgent need for change. The impact of MBC was massive as it was performed in over 13 locations about human trafficking and what should be the immediate response when one encounters such a situation.
- CSP fund raising activities enabled a sense of giving and caring for the underprivileged among the college students and through the help of which, children's education was able to be funded.
- Milan allowed the holistic development of the children from our project areas, inculcating a healthy habit of physical activity in their daily life while learning and having fun. The children learnt the importance of diversity as they mingled with children from other project areas and built a spirit of sportsmanship in a friendly environment.

#### Future Plan:

- Strengthen the collaboration with other NGOs.
- Strengthen the volunteer engagement through newly formed co-harts for Student Voluntary Body.
- Conduct CSA week
- Promote rural camps for students.
- Establish Parivarthana Unit in the campus.
- Facilitate events to improve and develop skills among volunteers by workshops and interactive sessions and collaborations with individuals and organisations.
- Promote 'Social Entrepreneurship' for engaging the Christ community in order to inculcate sustainable ideas and provide a platform for volunteers to engage and learn from influential entrepreneurs and to foster a space of creative ideas to direct the future towards impactful, green decisions.
- Create skits/plays to be performed by Drishti this year addressing the audience from slum areas to schools to malls focusing a wide range of topics such as addiction, abuses, health and wellbeing, and environmental concern.
- Conducts events such as Career Fest, Anti-Plastic campaign, waste management, etc.

#### **DELHI NCR Campus**

CSA was established in CHRIST Delhi NCR campus during 2019 with a vision to make every student aware, sensitive, empathetic and contributing to sustainable changes in the society. CSA is a centre for promoting volunteerism and enabling students to develop as socially responsible citizens through developmental initiatives. As a student volunteer body CSA over the years engaging student volunteers in social development initiatives through i) Activity Centre - education and skill development, ii) Maitri - environment sustainability, iii) Drishti - act, react and impact, iv) Media and Communication - create, express and reform, and v) Anti Human Trafficking Club, facilitated by inter-dependent student wings.

During 2022-23 CSA provided a platform to 425 students to learn be responsible and respectful towards society and to work for a cause engaging in volunteering activities, which helped them to connect with the society and thereby contributing towards sustainable change in the society. CSA had strongly engaged in addressing issues related to child rights, socio-economic development of women, youth and farmers, livelihood, community mobilization, animal rights and environment/climate change issues in 2 slums of Delhi NCR (Bombay Colony and Nai Basti).

#### **Major Achievements:**

- Early Learning and Training Centres: There are two activity centres being maintained 'Neev' at Bombay Colony and 'Buniyad' at Nai Basti. These centres are functioning from afternoon till evening providing supplementary education to 70 children from the locality, besides providing non-formal education to children for enrolling them in formal schools. CSA volunteers work with children engaging them with various soft skill development activities, developing communication skills, art, sports and culture, and group activities that enhances their talents and promote team work. Republic day painting competition was conducted for children of Buniyad centre with participation of 44 children. Unnathi, an awareness session on good touch and bad touch was organized for the children at Ghaziabad on 30 Jan 2023, benefiting 32 (12 boys and 20 girls) children at Neev centre. Student volunteers from the university facilitated the learning through videos and group exercises. Sixty children from Buniyad centre were provided with educational kits, which ensured the responsible learning among the marginalized children.
- Skill Development Training to youth and children: Around 55 children and youth were provided with skill building training in working with the computers during 2022-23. Student volunteers have been the computer teachers in training them in familiarising with computers, using computers/mobiles for internet browsing, building knowledge through using search engines and sourcing information, accessing on-line services, etc.
- **Sensitization of women:** Women are benefitted through various sensitization sessions on different issues and concerns topics that are related to their everyday life. In the bargain even the student volunteers also got themselves sensitized on various issues affecting the poor and marginalized communities in slums.
- *Health promotion:* Conducted free one each health camp in both the slums and adopted schools, and conducted blood donation drives in collaboration with a Government Blood Bank and have facilitated free blood to the poor and needy. CSA also facilitated distribution of free wheel chairs to the differently abled persons. There was also three sensitization facilitated by student volunteers on Mental health and wellbeing in collaboration with the Department of Psychology on 6 & 9 July 2022 and 11 July 2023, benefiting a total of 81 children. A workshop on Menstrual Hygiene was conducted on 8 Mar 2023 for 34 adolescent girls of Bombay colony. CHRIST, Ghaziabad faculty had sensitized the participants for adopting low cost but safe hygiene practices and disposal of used menstrual products.
- *Livelihood promotion:* Workshops Sustainable livelihoods through small enterprise training programme for women of the slum areas was organized to empower them through skill training and through activities like Rakhi Making and Computer Saksharta. 32 children from Bombay Colony got trained in Rakhi making on 28 July 2022 by the student volunteers, while 15 children were trained developing skills of computer literacy by Department of Science, CHRIST Ghaziabad campus on 17 Feb 2023.
- *Eco*-Ville: On 6<sup>th</sup> Aug 2022, the volunteers conducted a special drive for collecting clothes and stationeries for the children of the project area. Mobilized clothes and stationeries were distributed to 45 children and helped to have additional clothes and basic stationeries for aiding their learning.
- *Clean-up Drive:* Around 400 students came together to promote cleanliness around the University campus on 8<sup>th</sup> Oct 2022. National Cadet Corps (NCC) from the nearby government

- school had also participated in the drive, which was witnessed by a larger community, signalling them about the importance of keeping the environment clear and hygienic.
- *Udaan*: Christmas Carnival for the children of project are observed in the campus on 15<sup>th</sup> Dec 2022. Various activities including cultural programmes were performed by the student volunteers benefiting 85 children from the project area.
- *Jagruk*: The students of the university visited the adopted school to perform activity related to SDG 4 & 5, which advocate promoting quality education for all, especially girl children and ensuring gender equality and empower all women and girls. Around 250 children from the project area benefited through the programme.
- *Computer Saksharata:* A certificate programme in computer application was conducted for a period of three months for 15 children from the project area and they are provided with certificates on 17 Feb 2023.
- **Sustainable Holi:** Children from nearby 'Composite school' are sensitized 08 March 2023 on safe and sustainable 'Holi' festival celebrations. Around 250 school children learnt the pre and post safety measures to be maintained while celebrating 'holi'.

#### **Benefit to Volunteers:**

- Student volunteers became aware of the necessary policies and how they can help to aid the development of marginalized communities.
- Volunteers at CSA, are dedicated and committed regarding current social, political and economic matters, which can contribute to their holistic development, build up greater awareness and empathy towards society and its people, as they grow academically.
- They work with women, children of the marginalized section and understand the ground reality of the country that we live in. Volunteers also experienced personal growth in terms of working with the marginalized, addressing social issues, developing skills, building connections and networking.

#### **Benefit to Community:**

- The Centre for Social Action taken up various activities and events this year that would help for the betterment of the community to aid empowerment of people and to build sustainable communities.
- The children in the community get the opportunity to visit the university campus participating in various activities conducted for them in the campus like Christmas carnival, children's day celebration and they ultimately carry with them a dream to take up higher education.
- Many of the families have understood the need for quality and time appropriate education to their wards. There is gradual reduction in school dropout rates and an increase is noted in school retention. Events like the Child Sponsorship Day motivates students to strive for the best.
- Health seeking behaviour of the marginalized community is on the increase. They attend to the common ailments by approaching nearby health centres and hospitals for accessing treatment. Medical camps and blood donation camps promotes helping healthier individuals in the community.
- Street plays have been an important source of building awareness among the community on social issues.
- Programs on financial literacy for women and opening of a bank account have aided in the benefit of the women in the community.

#### **Future Plan:**

- Forming and strengthening SHGs in the project area, with the aim of empowering the women and also to sensitize them about various issues being faced by them.
- Establishing a tailoring unit and train young girls and women to take up tailoring as profession and guide them to become independent.
- Setting up a library at the Composite School, which would help the children to get an exposure to read books other than the course/subject book.
- Establishing a paper recycle unit in Ghaziabad campus, so that the paper waste generated can be recycled and reused, besides generating awareness on waste management.
- Organizing health camps in the community and Govt. Schools in the project area and to provide free medical check-up.
- Organizing blood donation camp in order to make available the free blood supply to the poor and the needy in collaboration with a government blood bank.
- Adopting a village and work with the community for facilitating student exposure and learning in understanding the problem being faced by the community and propose appropriate remedial measures

## **Kengeri Campus**

Centre for Social Action began its operations in Kengeri campus during 2010-11. CSA is a platform for students to volunteer to play their role in volunteering for social issues. CSA from Kengeri campus makes sure that students balance their academic excellence with their social responsibility. This annual report consists of the details, impact, benefits for the community impacted by CSA, Kengeri during 2022-23 engaging 500 student volunteers and 90 children.

#### **Major Achievements:**

- Waste Management Survey: The waste management practices previously implemented on the Kengeri campus had proven to be ineffective due to an inadequate number of dustbins, poor waste segregation, and improper waste disposal. To come up with more effective strategies and initiatives, a survey was conducted with an intention of suggesting specific initiatives and long-term solutions. The volunteers collected the required data for the same, including the number of dustbins and the number of people generating the waste in comparison according to the crowd and requirements of specific eateries. This survey came out with recommendations of dustbins aligning with number of students and new initiatives and strategies that can be implemented to pave the way for a better waste management system and a cleaner and greener campus.
- *Ribbon's Club:* The Ribbons Club conducted several activities since January 2023 to generate awareness on various social issues and concerns by reaching out to communities. 'Disha', in

Kengeri campus review literature and identify topics that are of socially importance and plan appropriate awareness activities to be conducted across the campus and other locations outside the campus. Some of the social issues that were addressed include Substance Abuse, Gynaecological Cancer, mental well-being, etc.

- **Disha Engineering Projects:** Engineering projects under Disha Wing is an ambitious endeavour aimed at integrating various engineering disciplines to develop innovative solutions and tackle real-world challenges. This project brings together the brightest minds from different engineering branches within CSA to collaboratively design and implement cutting-edge technologies. The project team, consisting of students and faculty mentors had formulated 'Cancer detection application' (Aug 2022) and 'Incinerator' (April 2023). The team is continuing their efforts towards identifying problems in the fields of automation, robotics, renewable energy, smart infrastructure, artificial intelligence, etc. Through brainstorming sessions and rigorous evaluation, the team will select the most impactful projects that align with the goals of the Disha Wing.
- **Book Donation Drive:** CSA volunteers conducted a week-long book donation drive during fourth week of July 2022 with in the Kengeri campus. At the end of the drive, 75 books were donated to this noble cause by the students, faculty as well as the college library. The books received included a wide spectrum of genres like philosophical, novel, fairy tales, self-help, grammar and art. CSA volunteers visited NEST (a home for orphans) and handed over the donated books to the children.
- *Chat Over Coffee:* This is an interactive session conducted on 29 July 2022 igniting insight of every single member and sharing of their thoughts about sustainable lifestyle. The talk also took on a slightly philosophical note, where our purposes in life was discussed and volunteers were asked to connect it to Sustainable Lifestyle.
- *Aurora:* Aurora, a remarkable event organized by the Activity Centre wing of CSA on the special occasion of Sports Day. The event extended a warm invitation to students from Sneha Jyothi and NEST schools, offering them a day filled with excitement and fun-filled activities.
- Drishti Plays: The CSA wing Drishti performed a play My Body My Choice in the campus and then later in Gopalan Arcade Mall on 24 Aug 2022. The play raised awareness of women's rights to their choices regarding their own body. The play depicted a story of 2 women with contrasting opinions on their pregnancy. While one of them wanted to keep the child, the other woman wanted an abortion. The main aim of the play was to raise awareness about the recent overturn of the Roe Vs Wade verdict in USA, where now it has become illegal to get an abortion. The play intends to spark conversation about women's rights in terms of safety, equality and societies view on women and their choices. A play titled 'Not Anymore' performed on 23 Sep 2022 is an attempt to welcome the juniors. This play focused on the topic of anti-ragging and anti- bullying and was done in collaboration with the Anti-Ragging cell of CHRIST (Deemed to be University). It acted as a framework to let students know that they need not shun the urge to raise their voice and speak up against any form of harassment they experience or notice around them. Yet another play Beyond the Closet is performed on 26 Nov 2022 in the campus and later in Bayalu Ranga Mandira, near Town Hall for the occasion of Pride celebrations. The play actors put up a mind blowing and heart touching performance about the difficulties that are faced by people of the LGBTQ+ community. The play was greeted with a standing ovation and a round of applause for being able to make individuals feel like they're not alone in the battle against oppression.
- *Inara*: Inara was an event aimed at initiating various activities for the development of an individual through the art of acting and street plays through various competitions, workshops

and stalls facilitated by Drishti team. It aimed to create an impact on the differently abled children of Krishna Chaitanya, a CSA project area. The event conducted for three days (29-30 March and 01 April 2023) consisted of an acting-based competition whose major themes included 'equality and quality education'. A dance-based event which was based on the themes of neuro-divergence and equality, a workshop on the expression of emotions through acting and a visit to Krishna Chaitanya's where activities were conducted to promote the well-being of the 38 children there and a few tools for facilitating the learning of these students were donated.

- Marathon for Gynaecological Cancer Awareness: CSA collaborated with the Sports council of the college to organize a Marathon to promote awareness of Gynaecological Cancer and the new vaccine released in India for cervical cancer on 02 Sep 2022. Volunteers engaged in distributing ribbons and face painting. A photo booth was also set up in the same spot for the promotion of the event. Aside from students, we also had non-teaching and teaching faculty join us for the marathon. The event started at 4:30, and the participants completed one lap across the campus to complete the 5km marathon. Medals were distributed to the first fifty to complete the marathon.
- Peer Education for NEST children: Six Peer Education mentors along with CSA Activity Centre volunteers conducted regular visits to NEST, which is a home for orphans from Sep 2022 to March 2023. The aim of this collaboration was to identify any well-being issues faced by the children residing there, specifically related to mental health. The Peer mentors were chosen for this as they are trained and sensitized towards many prominent issues and were trusted to communicate with the children to get insights into what problems they might be facing.
- *English Classes for Housekeeping staff:* CSA conducted English classes for the housekeeping staff from Nov 2022 to March 2023 to teach them basic communication skills in English. The classes took place throughout the year with a particular set of volunteers.
- *Nauka Classes:* Nauka classes are an initiative towards ensuring that the students of class 10th are able to study and understand and the concepts in their respective syllabi, and pass their board exams with flying colours. Students were selected from CHRIST (Deemed to be University), and these students go once a week (from Nov 2022 to March 2023) as per their allocations and teach allotted subjects to the students. There are plenty of doubt clearing sessions and individual attention is also given.
- *Rural Exposure Camp:* A two-day rural camp was conducted at one of the project sites of CSA in Kolar district benefiting 40 student volunteers. The objective of the rural exposure camp was to sensitize the CSA volunteers to the way of rural life and its various aspect by activities like agriculture, clean-up drives and sports for 40 children.
- Milan: A biennial event conducted for three days (12 to 14 Feb 2023) at CHRIST involving 250 children from CSA's project sites. Volunteers of CSA was facilitating the days, providing these kids options and experiences they've never had before is a leap toward their happiness. Children took part in activities like athletics, dance, workshop, cultural nights, and many other events. Through these activities the volunteers tried to help the children who discover their hobbies, and areas of interest and help them to take a step toward realizing their goals.

#### **Impact on community**

• The Weekday Classes and Weekend Visits to the partnering organisations have helped us to ensure quality education to all those children who required it the most. Also the helping staffs

- of the university were also able to develop their linguistic skills, which would be helpful to interact with the students and others in due course of time.
- Inmates of Krishna Chaitanya were helped with not only getting access to education but also providing them with equipment for the good health and wellbeing of those in need.
- Various sensitization plays helped the community to speak up and raise their voice against injustices.

#### **Impact on Volunteers**

- All the classes and workshops conducted by the students helped them in personal growth as it helped them enhance their communication, leadership skills as well as their ability to adapt.
- Volunteers who were engaged in plays, awareness campaigns and other things got to learn more about different community.
- Coming up with unique solutions to address and solve the problem helped our volunteers in enhancing their problem-solving skills and to ability to make quick decisions.
- Our volunteers also get to meet and interact with other people with diverse background which helped them in getting exposure to diverse perspectives and experiences and broaden their horizon, not to forget about fostering of empathy.

#### Future plan

- Collaborations with different NGOs.
- Health and plantation drive across the Gopal Nagara village.
- Organ donation and hair donation drives amongst the students.
- Awareness generation on mental health, menstruation, nutrition, sexual abuse etc., and yoga and exercise drives to promote overall well-being.
- Career and Educational Fests will be conducted for organizations to make the children aware of the options available for them to have a brighter future.
- Clean and green initiatives, such as clean-up drives outside the campus and awareness campaigns to promote sustainability and better waste management.
- Video series and documentaries to showcase the hardships faced by the community.
- Publish CSA newsletters and magazines.
- Sensitization through 'plays' focusing on several social issues with a wide range of audience from schools, NGOs, malls to campus.
- Continue events like 'Chat over Coffee' and other interactive activities such as workshops.

## **LAVASA Campus**

Centre for Social Action in CHRIST( Deemed to be University) Lavasa campus started functioning from August 2019. As an important wing driven by the student promoting volunteerism among them and addressing the social concerns of the rural children and communities. The students from different cultural backgrounds and ethnicities serve together for the development of the people around them. 177 CSA Volunteers have the opportunity to explore more about the communities around the campus during 2022-23. Ensuring quality education to the underprivileged children is the major focus of CSA in Lavasa campus. Volunteers identified 3 villages near to the campus and initiated activities that helped them in developing in to more responsible citizens. More than 150 children and around 100 women from these villages have directly benefited from various activities of CSA including weekend classes for the children from nearby schools, clean-up drive, nature walk, etc.

#### **Major Achievements:**

- **Signed MOU with KITES INDIA Foundation**: KITES INDIA is an NGO that works for the development of youth. CSA in Lavasa campus signed an MOU with them to identify and address the issues faced by youth and for developing their leadership skills.
- **Project Bridge:** Project Bridge is an important activity coordinated by the volunteers for conducting weekend classes for the school going children around Lavasa campus. More than 140 children benefitted out of this project implemented from Oct 2022 to Feb 2023 by 30 student volunteers.
- Activity Kit Distribution: The volunteers of Maanavee wing distributed Activity kits for 35 kids in the nearby Tribal village during Sep 2022. These kits included activity note books, stationeries, etc., which did help the children for engaging them in meaningful learning activities, thus assuring a quality education.
- Project Pradhan: There two events conducted under this project; one is a book donation drive and the other is collecting used cloths and stationeries. Book donation drive was an activity conducted for two days (9 & 10 Sep 2022) that collected used books of senior students and sold to junior students for a token price. The mobilized money thus collected was invested on stationeries distributed to 75 children of Project Bridge. The other event collecting used cloths and stationeries from college outgoing students, was a long drive from 31 Oct 2022 to 16 Feb 2023. Collection boxes were kept at different places in the campus by the student volunteers. Volunteers segregated the items and cloths were distributed to 50 people residing in a village near to the Lavasa campus, while the stationeries were distributed to the children of the same village.
- **Drishti Street Plays:** The volunteers of Drishti wing coordinated 4 different acts based on social issues. Anti-ragging play was conducted during Oct 2022 benefitting 60

- students in collaboration with Anti-Ragging Cell and School of Law from the university, while the street play on drug abuse conducted during Dec 2022 was witnessed by around 100 common people.
- Clean up drives and Nature walks: Prayatna wing of CSA had conducted two clean up drives across Lavasa city as Good Deeds Day campaign during March 2023. At least one each kilometres of the area in in two different locations in Lavasa was cleaned up by 40 student volunteers. They were joined by another 50 community members in collaboration with an NGO KITES INDIA. There was also a nature walk to explore the beauty of Lavasa city involving the student volunteers and volunteers from the collaborators, which garnered the attention and support from the tourists who came to the city.
- Cancer Awareness Day parade: There were two events conducted on 03 Mar 2023 and 04 April 2023 to commemorate 'World Cancer Day', with the aim of raising awareness about cancer, which causes millions of deaths every year and pressing individuals across the society to take appropriate action to prevent cancer. The events benefitted approximately 50 people and 65 student volunteers.

## **YPR Campus**

CSA at Yeshwanthpur campus was formally established on 10 November 2022. About 250 students have registered with CSA during 2022-2023. The CSA at Yeshwanthpur campus is taking baby steps in initiating all the activities that form part of the verticals of CSA. Currently we have engaged these volunteers wot work in two villages with 25 famlies, 50 children, 20 women and 15 youth. Efforts are on to extend the volunteering activities to Indhira Nagar near Nagasandra. The student voluntary body will structure its activities accordingly to newly framed cohorts. More focus will be rendered to waste management activities including re-cycling of waste and sensitize the students on waste management practices.

#### **Major Activities:**

- *Rural Exposure:* During 2022-23, the students had an opportunity to rural immersion and learning with one of the project sites of CSA at Kolar district. A team of 49 students learnt the rural life, culture, livelihood, festivals celebrated, early childhood education centres, etc.
- **Promotion of Parivarthana products:** This was an event where sale stalls were put up for promoting recycled paper products produced by Parivarthana unit of CSA on 27 Feb 2023. Information about dry waste and wet waste collection, segregation, recycling and manufacturing paper products were shared with students. There was also stalls selling 'artefacts' made by students too. As part of the promotion, 'Drishti' team put up a street play to introduce CSA.
- *Treasure Hunt:* Prayatna wing of CSA conducted a treasure hunt and the clues were all related to the contribution of Parivarthana in waste management and on preserving the mother earth. The hunt was participated by 39 students on 24 Mar 2023. Recycled paper products from Parivarthana were also promoted through putting up a stall for selling the products.
- *Milan '23:* This is an intercampus biennial event conducted by CSA during Feb 2023, where children from all project areas come and participate in games, art and cultural activities, sports, etc., for three days. As a pre-lude to this event CSA volunteers had put up stalls to spread information about MILAN'23, and with that we also had the

- Parivarthana products kept for sale. There was also play performed by Drishti team to promote MILAN'23.
- **Book Donation Drive:** CSA volunteers conducted a book donation drive for five days from 20 to 25 February 2023. The donated books were distributed to a nearby government school benefiting around 50 students.
- *Women's Day:* On 8 Mar 2023, women day was observed involving all the housekeeping staff of the campus facilitated by student volunteers. There was a technical session on mental health, and cultural activities to mark the occasion, besides a street play performed by Drishti team promoting girls' education.
- *Financial Literacy:* The non-teaching staff of the campus were sensitized on the different financial assistance and loan schemes that are available with financial institutions, especially from government. Faculties from Department of Commerce facilitated the learning session participated by 50 non-teaching staff.

#### **Benefit to Volunteers:**

• The volunteers learned about the adopting to different environment and locations to live with and learn from the community. Rural camp also helped the students to initiate actions to adopt a village community near to Yeshwanthpur campus.

#### 5. SPECIAL PROJECTS

CSA is also implementing a few special projects in different States/locations, viz., Kainakary, Niravilpuzha, and Snehagiri in Kerala, and Jettikundi in Karnataka.

#### 1.1. Integrated Community Development Project (ICDP), Niravilpuzha, Kerala

This project is been implemented at Niravilpuzha, Wayanad, Kerala since ........ in coordination with Cyriac Elias Voluntary Association (CEVA) aimed at developing skills of the village 64 youth with diversified skill development initiatives like tailoring, driving and other livelihood activities and developing computer literacy of the 117 children.

#### **Objectives:**

- To provide enhanced educational support to students and help students overcome specific challenges they may face in their studies.
- To provide individuals with the necessary skills and knowledge in the field of tailoring
- To promote digital literacy skills for the children

#### **Impact created:**

- Improvement in students' academic performance
- Enhanced confidence and self-esteem among the village children and youth.
- Creation of employment opportunities for youth, contributing to skill upgradation, career advancement and economic empowerment of the individuals.
- Empowered children with digital skills, knowledge and enabling them to navigate and utilize technology effectively.

#### **Major Achievement:**

• Academic Support centres: Fifty-two children have been attending the special coaching provided through the centre. Coaching was given to the children according to the learning level. With this coaching here, there has been a good improvement in the learning standards of the children. During the vacation



months of April and May, apart from the children of the centre, special tuition was given to the children of the Pannipad Colony near to the Centre. They have been able to make good academic progress.

#### • Vocational Skill Development

Vocational skill development centre has provided training in tailoring for 64 youths during 2022-2023 for a period of 3 months. Certificates were given to 10 people. After the training one student opened a tailoring shop in the



town and 37 people started maintaining tailoring unit in their own homes.

#### • Digital Learning Centre

Computer classes were conducted in two batches with a duration of six months each. A total of 65 children were trained in handling the computers with various MS Office tools.

After successful training two of them got jobs in Akshaya Centre being maintained by Government. It was very beneficial for the children studying in middle and high school as the computer practical classes are available only for a short time in the school and they get their learning reinforced through the digital learning centre.



#### **Benefit to Community:**

The project benefits the overall academic performance of students in the community and reduced educational disparities within the community contributing to a stronger and more resilient community. A team of skilled tailors have ensured the livelihood of their families through supplementing the family income. A computer-literate community has promoted has helped in educating children and community members about responsible digital citizens and follow online safety practices.

#### 1.2. Saint Chavara Community Development Centre, Kainakary, Kerala

Saint Chavara Community Development Centre is (SCCDC) the social face of Kainakary village, the birth place of St. Chavara one of the prominent Social Reformers in India functioning since 2002. The focus of the activities of SCCDC is to promote the Social welfare and address problems in human lives through empowerment and liberation of people. SCCDC has conducted plethora of activities for the betterment of the members in the community including medical camps, monetary support program to enhance health conditions, awareness sessions on rescue and safety and has also contributed to the knowledge acquisition for numerous students through internship opportunities.

#### **Objectives:**

- To improve the standard of life for the community members of Kainakary
- To generate awareness on the various health conditions and preventive measures
- To promote higher education and provide guidance
- To collaborate with various institutions to promote networking in bridging the development gaps.



#### **Major Achievement:**

- Career Guidance Classes: A 2-days Career Guidance Class in collaboration with Chavara Friends Club was organized. Children from 15 wards of Kainakary Grama panchayat have participated the class. The participants benefitted from learning the best career choices and prepared them about better planning, exploring opportunities, and enrolment trials, etc.
- Promotion of Internship: 16 MSW students from Assumption College, Changanaserry had undergone internship training.
- Health Survey: A survey
  was conducted in a
  couple of wards of
  Kainakary Panchayat to
  assess the general health
  situation of the
  panchayat. Skin diseases
  was reported by most of
  the people, which was of



polluted water in the vicinity of the panchayat.

- Improved economic status of the family through increased income potential, and the ability to break the cycle of poverty.
- Pradhithi 2022: 7 days' community study camp was conducted as part of promotion of internship and research work on SCDC with the support of Social Work Students from Assumption College, Changanaserry during this year. Baseline study was conducted employing Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), home visits, Focus Group Discussion with children and Elderly.
- Promotion of Education: During the reporting period SCCDC has given away ₹85,000 towards the financial support for higher studies and professional courses of deserving and marginalized children.
- Awareness Training: SCCDC organized 10 sessions on generating awareness on pollution, and various types, sources of plastic waste, impact of plastic use, remedial measures to



reduce the usage of plastic among household, etc., in collaboration with Kainakary Grama Panchayat.

• Eye camp: SCCDC organized a free eye camp in collaboration with Ahalya Foundation, Changanaserry for the senior citizens of the panchayat. Needed patients were treated with provision of free spectacles and medicines. Around 200 people had been benefitted out of the camp.

- Medical Support: During 2022-23 a sum of nearly one lakh was provided to the community members ranging from ₹5000 to ₹10,000 as a medical support for treating illnesses like cancer, bipolar affective disorder, kidney diagnosis, chronic heart diseases, and any specific illnesses that required medical surgery.
- Chavara Rescue Classes: In collaboration with Department of Health, Police, Fire and Rescue, and Excise, five rescue classes were organized in 5 wards of the panchayat. Relevant sessions covering topics like operating fire extinguishers, road safety rules, management of everyday minor accidents, minor cuts, graze bleeding and burns, laws related to liquor, narcotic drugs and psychotropic substance were discussed.
- Observing days of social and cultural importance: SCCDC had observed the Anti-drug day through conducting a poster competition involving 50 children to understand the seriousness of drug abuse and preventive measures. Onam and Christmas were celebrated by conducting various games for the members of the community to spread the love and good cheer. Visit to Elderly homes were also carried out to spend quality



- time with the disadvantaged population, sing carols and gift some cakes. Women's day was also celebrated by the Chavara friends Club.
- Chavara Counselling Centre: In order to provide continuous and timely counselling and
  professional assistance in handling the personal and professional problems the Chavara
  Counselling Centre was established during this year. The centre is professionally
  managed with counsellor. During this year the centre counselled 28 persons. Clients
  needing more specialized services were referred to the nearby government hospitals for
  psychiatric treatment and care.

#### **Impact created:**

The potential impact created at Kainakary through the mentioned programs includes

- Increased access for higher education and professional education.
- Strengthened Community Resilience
- Existence of Social Cohesion and Community Development
- Improvement in health indicators.
- Increased awareness among individuals and communities for early detection and treatment of diseases resulting in increased access to essential healthcare services, and better management of chronic illnesses.
- Improved immunization coverage.

• Improved economic status of the family through increased income potential, and the ability to break the cycle of poverty.

- Scaling up similar programmes and activities.
- Strengthening Collaboration and Partnerships
- Advocacy and Policy Engagement

#### 1.3. Empowerment of Youth in Mala Gram Panchayat, Snehagiri, Kerala

The project empowerment of youth in Mala gram panchayat at Snehagiri in Thrissur district, Kerala is three-year project and not at the final year of its period, focusing on the mass empowerment of youth towards community development.

#### **Objectives:**

- To contribute towards community development through youth empowerment
- To develop a resource centre and a support system to coordinate and sustain community development initiatives.
- To improve the living standards of the community through social capital generation.

#### **Major Achievements:**

- Youth Orientation: Youth Development and Leadership programme is conducted on 9<sup>th</sup> May 2022 for 22 youth from Mala gram panchayat to prepare them to meet the challenges of adolescence, adulthood and achieve his or her full potential. This programme included activities and experiences that help the youth develop social, ethical, emotional, physical, and cognitive competencies, which would help them in developing the ability to analyze his or her strengths and weaknesses. It also includes setting personal and vocational goal, having self-esteem, confidence, motivation, and abilities to carry them out.
- Goal Setting Programme for Youth: During May 2022 a one-day orientation was conducted for 20 youth on goal setting and selecting a career. Youth were guided to set goals for the life through some games and exercise. They were given a few tips on how to make a career choice and what all factors that should be considered while making a career choice. The choice of a career depends on the job prospects of the field and most certainly the interest of the candidate.
- Street Theatre Arts: This program was intended to shape lives through theatre education by enriching the theatre education experience of the youth of Mala gram panchayat. This program offered a range of academic, social, and emotional benefits to the youth. This included a greater ability to accept people with different opinions from their own and understand the diversity of ways others experience the world. A theatre art expert had sensitized 25 youth about i) the danger of addiction behaviour (both drug as well as

- alcohol), ii) violence against women through performing theatre arts. A number of practical sessions and rehearsals were done.
- Seminar on Drugs and its Bad Effects on the Youth: As a part of an on-going training programme to the youth a seminar on 'Drugs and its bad-effects on the youth' was organized and participated by 40 youth. The participants were made to understand the substance use disorder caused by substances such as alcohol, marijuana, narcotics, steroids, cannabis, opium, etc. They were also helped to understand the imbalances that the substance use bringing in personal and social life.
- Rights of Minorities: 35 youth and their parents participated in sensitization session on Rights of Minorities highlighting Article 26 of Indian Constitution. Constitution provides the religious minorities the right to establish and maintain institutions for religious and charitable purposes and to manage their own affairs in matters of religion, in any manner they wish to administer and maintain such property in accordance with the law. He reiterated that the religious minorities have been assured by provisions in our constitution that their special interests religious, cultural, educational and social are to be protected.
- Winners' Day '22: On 25th June 2022, the students obtained Grade A+ in the Mala panchayat were honoured ceremonially. Thrissur District Panchayat President inaugurated the meeting and delivered an inspiring speech. Mr. Babu.T.K gave a brief introduction about Miss: Asna Sherin, who in spite of her Spinal Muscular Atrophy (SMA), achieved Full A+ in SSLC Examination. She shared her experiences and gave a very motivational speech. She was honoured with a Certificate of Appreciation and a Cash Award. Then the School with the highest Full A+ was honoured, followed by the students who achieved Full A+ in SSLC Exam. Four selected students from Snehagiri Locality who got Full A+ in Plus Two Examination were specially honoured. These meritorious students shared the secret of their success- how they studied, how much time they spent and what was the best time to study etc. This was followed by an interactive session conducted by Mr. Babu.T.K. He gave some valuable guidelines on how to prepare for competitive examinations. The students were given opportunity to clarify their doubts thoroughly.
- Outing to Athirapilly and CSR Pariyaram: A one-day outing to Athirappilly-Waterfall and CSR Pariyaram was arranged on 28th July for the students who passed SSLC Examination in 2022. They were accompanied by Fr. Joy Vattoly, the Director, Snehagiri Society, Mr. Babu.T.K, Mr. Gikhil and Mr. Jisbin Jose. The group left from Snehagiri at 8.15 a.m. with a prayer led by Rev.Fr. Joy Vattoly CMI. They spent about two hours at Athirappilly-Waterfall. All enjoyed the scenery and the natural breeze there. Then they proceeded to 'CSR' Pariyaram which is a retreat-centre located on the bank of Chalakudy River. They had lunch over there in that serene atmosphere. After the lunch, there was a sharing session in which all the students expressed their future plan of study, revealed their aspirations and ambitions. It was followed by games, fun and some entertainments which was a kind of relaxation for everyone. Mr. Jisbin Jose who holds a Master's degree took a lively class to the students. He gave a true scenario of this competitive world and enlightened the students with his practical knowledge and relevant information that mainly focused on how to prepare effectively for competitive exams. The students

- clarified their doubts from him regarding Civil Services Examinations, Training/Coaching Centers, Necessary Sites, and the like.
- Competitive Exam Orientation cum Educational Kit Distribution: As a part of Competitive Exam Orientation, CYC Snehagiri conducted an Educational Kit Distribution in which 75 students participated. They were given a number of study materials that would enable them to prepare effectively for the Competitive exams. Several dignitaries were present at the function and they gave inspiring speeches to motivate the youth to inculcate in them a habit or desire for preparing competitive exams in a systematic manner.
- Orientation on Competitive Exam to Young Women: A meeting of Femina members was held at CYC Hall, Snehagiri on 9th June, 2022 from 6.00.p.m. to 7.15.p.m. About 40 female members and some parents were present at the meeting. The meeting commenced with a prayer song followed by the welcome speech by Rev. Fr. Dr. Joy Vattoly, the Director Snehagiri Society. Rev. Sr. Dr. Vimala CMC, the Chief-Guest, gave an inspiring talk and highlighted the need of women to come to the fore-front and become responsible leaders to lead the society. She also spoke about the necessity of growing up with moral values, promoting Christian virtues, spreading the messages of peace, love & patience and becoming ideal leaders.
- CYC Animators' and Leaders' Meet: The main purpose of this program was to review and plan for the future regarding some of the impending activities. The animators encouraged the CYC leaders-to come to the fore-front and give their innovative ideas and suggestions. They suggested increasing the frequency of the leaders' meet. It was decided to conduct the leaders meeting prior to every program as it would give more opportunities to the leaders to involve themselves in the planning level till the end when these planning are precisely executed.
- Onam "Then" and "Now": On 3rd September, 2022 CYC Snehagiri organized a unique 'Onam Celebration'. It was titled Onam 'Annum' (Then), 'Innum' (Now). The CYC members had prepared a beautiful 'Pookalam' (floral arrangements or colour sketches on the floor or ground). The celebration started at 3.00.p.m. with a prayer song. Fr. Joy Vattoly CMI welcomed the audience and declared that it was quite an informal gathering. Then the sharing session started in which many elderly people shared their sweet memories and experiences of their younger days. Their sharing was very informative and useful to the whole audience. It was a new knowledge and novel experience to the younger generation. Some of the CYC members spoke about how they celebrate Onam these days. This enabled them to compare the Onam celebration of olden days and the 'new-gen' Onam celebration. One of the participants sang a 'naadan paatu' which is a folk song sung to propitiate Gods seeking their blessings. CYC female members performed a fusion - a film song with dance which was similar to 'Thiruvathirakali' (Kerala's traditional folk dance or ritualistic dance performed by women). In a nut shell, the event was quite colourful and memorable to both the old generation and younger generation. All those who were present suggested that this new way of Onam Celebration should be continued in the future as well.

- CYC Get-together: In order to acknowledge and appreciate the CYC members' hard-work, Snehagiri Society organized a get-together for all the CYC members. The students were given valuable guidelines on the effective preparation for the Competitive Examinations. They were updated with the various developments that take place. The trend now is to migrate to abroad and many students don't want to prepare for PSC or UPSC, instead they want to leave India. The speakers highlighted the point that getting a government Job in India is much better than getting a job elsewhere. The students realised the dignity in getting a government job in our own country. Most of the students changed their minds and decided to pursue government jobs by intensive Competitive Exam Preparation.
- CYC Members' Christmas Celebration: On 22nd December 2022 CYC Snehagiri organized a Christmas Celebration for the youth of Mala Grama Panchayath. The youth took the initiative, made a crib, illuminated a Christmas-tree and hung the stars. All the youth sang the Carol Songs and joined the Santa Clause in singing and dancing to make the Christmas Celebration a meaningful one. Rev. Father Joy Vattoly CMI, the Director Snehagiri society gave the Christmas Message of Peace and Love to all those who were present. He also added that the youth should spread the spirit of peace & love. He reminded everyone that all should cultivate the habit of sharing throughout life. He emphasised the importance of competitive exams and getting a government job to settle and succeed in life.
- Leadership: CYC organized a programme intended to develop an insightful understanding of Leadership among the youth. Mr. Binu Kaliyadan, a well-known motivational speaker and the HR Director of training Hub, Aluva took the class on Leadership. Mr. Binu is an expert in giving motivational classes to the school and college students as well as corporates. On the out-set itself, the Resource Person stated that Leadership is the most observed but least understood phenomenon. He could capture the attention of the participants very easily. He spoke on the various aspects of leadership from his real-life situations which really had an effective impact on the participants. The session was quite lively, vibrant and interactive by itself and had lots of take-away. He enunciated that the functional leadership qualities such as good character, power, managerial capacity, initiative and responsibility are the quintessential of an ideal leader. The participants got an opportunity to play some games which go hand-in-hand with the theme 'Leadership'. The participants were given adequate time for reflection and in their feedback, they opined that the session was quite useful for their lives as they got various tips to be 'Good or Exemplary Leader' in today's world, in their own way. This programme enabled the participants to promote positive relationships with both the peers and the adults.

Goal setting.

It also aimed at providing professional development for the youth including influencing public opinion that theatre education is essential and builds life skills.

Theatre Art: This program helped the youth to introduce a concept of education that allows a space for dealing with sensuous impressions, examining knowledge, experiencing disconnections, re-experiencing meaningful connections and learning "how to know." This is a different form of education than where the emphasis is merely on the "flow of information."

**Duration**: The project started for 3 years from 1st April 2021 to 31st March 2024

#### **Long Term Objectives of the Project**:

- To help children with physical and mental disabilities to move forward to the mainstream of society
- To motivate them to join with their family, with society and with peer groups
- To make them continue with normal school education

#### **Short Term Objectives of the Project**:

- To support the family members of differently abled children
- To provide proper training through various skilled activities and craft works
- To organize celebrations and entertainments for these children
- To set up interactive platform with normal children
- To provide timely health interventions, health check-ups, immunization etc.
- To organize skills and income generation training

#### **Targeted Group**:

The beneficiaries of the project are children with mental and physical disabilities at the rural areas of Mysore. The target group for the disabled support program will be children age ranging from 6-20Yrs with a mental and physical disability in the district who live in poor families that cannot afford (medical) care for their children.
