ABSTRACT

The Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code 2016 provides a time-bound resolution to the Insolvency process and acts as a catalyst for improving the system of financial laws in India. A major enigma lies when issues arise regarding the recognition and enforcement of insolvency proceedings across different countries. This research critically studies on the emerging issues concerning the absence of a legal framework of Cross-Border Insolvency in India and also highlights the legal provisions of the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code, 2016, which merely touch on this subject. It executes the major theory of Modified Universalism in the global insolvency Proceedings, which emphasizes resolving the tension between international cooperation and national sovereignty. Later, the researcher studies the positive aspects of India adopting the UNCITRAL Model Law on Cross-Border Insolvency, thus providing more confidence to foreign Investors to invest in India. Also points out that the adoption of the international framework further results in fewer legal and procedural complexities in cross-border insolvency procedures, which significantly reduces the need for the creditors to file multiple proceedings across different jurisdictions. However, the increase in corporate globalization warns a siren alert of implementing an appropriate legal framework in India, which helps in promptly collecting and distributing assets, discharging debts and business rehabilitation. Later, the researcher studies the need for amendments to the IBC Code, 2016 to strengthen the cross-border insolvency framework in India, marking a meaningful change in Indian Insolvency Law.
