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#### Saving the Arctic Ecosystem 2 November, 2023

Venue: Room 734, II Floor, SOE

No. of Participants: 31

The School of Education, in collaboration with the Department of Life Sciences, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organised a guest lecture titled "Saving the Arctic Ecosystem" on November 2, 2023, led by Dr Suma Sarojini, Associate Professor, Department of Life Sciences. The session aimed to raise awareness among pre-service teachers about the fragile Arctic environment and its vital role in regulating the Earth's climate. Through an engaging presentation supported by visuals and data, Dr Suma discussed the alarming effects of melting ice caps, rising sea levels, and permafrost thawing, emphasising their impact on global biodiversity and human health.

The lecture also explored how resource extraction and commercial activities disrupt the Arctic's ecological balance, leading to habitat loss and species endangerment. Participants learned about global climate repercussions, including the flooding of Norway's seed vault and the decline of the Great Barrier Reef. The session concluded with a reflection on the role of educators in promoting environmental awareness through classroom teaching and community projects. By fostering knowledge, empathy, and responsibility, the initiative contributed to the global goal of climate action and inspired future teachers to view sustainability as a core life value and professional commitment.





# Climate action workshop 11 January, 2024

Venue: Christ University No. of Participants: 24

The Climate Action Workshop held at CHRIST (Deemed to be University) on 10 January 2024 aligned with SDG 13 Climate Action, aimed to raise awareness about the climate crisis and inspire youth-led environmental responsibility. The session, facilitated by Neha Jain, a student from Delhi University, combined storytelling, creativity, and dialogue to engage participants meaningfully. Through interactive storytelling, participants explored the impacts of climate change, shared personal experiences from their hometowns, and created storyboards expressing their perspectives and potential solutions. The workshop fostered a sense of community, encouraging students to become proactive climate leaders while emphasising collective responsibility toward sustainability. The event concluded with reflective discussions and feedback, leaving students motivated to incorporate climate-conscious practices in their daily lives and contribute to future environmental initiatives on campus.







#### Conservation of Wetlands: Ecosystem-based Adaptation of Climate Change 13 December, 2023

The Department of English and Cultural Studies, in collaboration with the Ecological Diversity Cell of CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organised a guest lecture titled "Conservation of Wetlands: Ecosystem-based Adaptation of Climate Change" on 13 December 2023, aligning with SDG 13 Climate Action. The session was led by Dr Ramachandra, Professor at the Indian Institute of Science, who delivered an insightful talk on the vital role of wetlands in mitigating the effects of climate change and promoting sustainable ecosystems. The lecture explored the interconnection between aquatic ecology, waste management, and socio-economic factors influencing environmental sustainability. Dr Ramachandra emphasised integrated solid waste management strategies as key to reducing greenhouse gas emissions and achieving sustainable urban living. Students and faculty gained valuable insights into ecosystem-based climate adaptation and the importance of informed environmental policies. The session concluded with an engaging Q&A, fostering deeper understanding and commitment toward conservation and climate action initiatives within the academic community.



#### Book talk on Climate Fiction 25 August, 2023


**Venue: R&D Block, CHRIST (Deemed to be University)**

The Department of English and Cultural Studies, in collaboration with the Ecological Diversity Cell of CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organised a Book Talk on Climate Fiction on August 25, 2023, at the R&D Block, aligning with SDG 13 Climate Action. The session was led by Pratyaksha Singh, a student of MA English with Communication Studies, who explored *Climate Fiction* as a genre that bridges science fiction, realism, and environmental consciousness. The discussion centred on *Polar City Red* by Jim Laughter and *The Ministry for the Future* by Kim Stanley Robinson, emphasising their portrayal of ecological crises and human resilience. The talk also introduced participants to eco-feminism and the concept of nine planetary boundaries, urging reflection on humanity's role in environmental degradation. Through engaging dialogue and critical insights, the event highlighted how literature can serve as a powerful tool to raise climate awareness and inspire sustainable action.







#### Boot Camp for ECHO 2023 22-23 September, 2023

The Ecological Diversity Cell of CHRIST (Deemed to be University), in collaboration with the World Wildlife Fund (WWF), organised a two-day Boot Camp for ECHO 2023 on September 22–23, 2023, to align with SDG 13 Climate Action. The Bootcamp brought together students from various disciplines and institutions to explore innovative approaches to sustainability and climate resilience. The sessions featured experts such as Dr Saji Varghese and Dr Padmakumar from CHRIST University, along with Neeti and Vidya from Azim Premji University, who guided participants through discussions on sustainable entrepreneurship, urban wildlife, and environmental innovation. Activities like the *Shark Tank* challenge and interactive group sessions fostered creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking. Participants gained practical insights into developing eco-friendly business models and actionable strategies for environmental sustainability. The event concluded with an inspiring address by Dr Varghese, motivating students to transform their ideas into impactful green initiatives and continue contributing to the global climate action movement.


# World Environment Day Photography Competition o5 June, 2023


#### Reimagining Forest Governance: Appraisal of the Forest Conservation Amendment Act 2023 06 October, 2023





#### SDG Week Stall 12 February, 2024




#### Industrial visit to StoveKraft 8 September, 2023

### SDG CELL Psychology Stall 02 July, 2023


**Venue: Academic Block entrance**





#### Inauguration Of Ecological Diversity Club 26 July, 2024

The Department of English and Cultural Studies, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), inaugurated the Ecological Diversity Club (EDC) on 26th July 2024, in collaboration with Prakheti and Earth Affair, under the theme "Climate Resilience through Agrobiodiversity." The event, held at the Council Room, Central Block, featured a guest lecture by Mr Arkesh Shenoy, Agro-biologist and co-founder of Prakheti Agrologics, who emphasised the importance of conserving native and heirloom crop varieties for climate sustainability. He discussed the historical evolution of agriculture, the impact of the Green Revolution on genetic diversity, and the urgent need to restore agrobiodiversity to ensure food security and ecological balance. The core committee for 2024–25 was also announced during the event. The session encouraged students to engage in sustainable practices and highlighted how agrobiodiversity can build resilience against climate change while promoting healthier, environmentally responsible food systems.






#### Exploring Exotic Plant Species: A Field Visit to Jawaharlal Nehru Tropical Botanical Garden and Research Institute 3 September, 2024

The Department of Life Sciences, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), organised a Skill Development Program titled "Exploring Exotic Plant Species" on 3rd September 2024 in collaboration with the Jawaharlal Nehru Tropical Botanical Garden and Research Institute (JNTBGRI), Palode, Kerala. The field visit, part of the department's MOU with JNTBGRI, aimed to provide third-year M.Sc. Botany students with practical exposure to tropical flora and their ecological roles. Students explored the garden's diverse collection of over 1,500 plant species, including rare and endemic varieties such as Gluta travencorica and Rauvolfia serpentina. The visit also included a guided tour of the herbarium, featuring more than 50,000 plant accessions. The session deepened students' understanding of plant taxonomy, medicinal botany, and conservation challenges in the face of climate change, fostering a greater appreciation for biodiversity preservation and sustainable ecological practices.



The session was delivered by Mr Arun Raj, Head of Green Finance at Eximpe, who shared his journey from marketing to sustainability and discussed the vital role of green finance instruments such as green bonds, carbon credits, concessional loans, and equity financing in addressing India's climate challenges. He highlighted how traditional economic models often overlook environmental externalities and emphasised the need for finance-driven climate solutions. The session encouraged students to integrate sustainability into their future professional pursuits, demonstrating how economic planning and financial strategies can be powerful tools in driving both environmental preservation and inclusive development.

# Essay Writing Competition & Plantation Drive 5 June 2024

The Department of English and Cultural Studies, CHRIST (Deemed to be University), Bannerghatta Road Campus, organised a Pre-Vachana Talk titled "EcoSpective Insights: Introduction to Ecological Discourses" on October 4, 2023, at the Seminar Hall, aligning with SDG 13 — Climate Action. Delivered by Professor Meghana Mudaliar, Associate Professor at CHRIST University, the session introduced students to the field of Environmental Humanities, emphasising its interdisciplinary nature, connecting literature, culture, and ecology. Drawing from her academic experience, Dr Mudaliar discussed key concepts such as Queer Ecologies and Sustainable Happiness, integrating literary and visual texts like Ishmael by Daniel Quinn, The Great Derangement by Amitav Ghosh, and excerpts from Brokeback Mountain. The talk also highlighted eco-feminism, intersectionality, and the pedagogical potential of environmental discourse in higher education. Encouraging students to critically engage with ecological narratives, Dr Mudaliar inspired them to view environmental issues through humanistic, cultural, and ethical lenses. The session concluded with a proposal from the core committee to screen one of the recommended visual texts for further learning and reflection.
